## Population of Nova Scotia Towns.

Ottawa, Aug. 24.—The following are the populations of the chief towns of Nova Scotia. The comparison between the census of 1891 and 1901, as regards these towns needs explanation. The towns in the census of 1891 included whole districts and not merely the towns proper.
