ma í su i ki'' šis, *n.* See Local Names.

ma i su tí pša ki, *n., fr.* isuti and ipsaki; an apron.

ma i tá, *n.*; an arrow; syn. itá.

ma i tá hi, *n.* See itahi.

ma i tá i su, *n., fr.* itaišu, and of similar meaning.

ma i ta mú a, *n., fr.* tamua; a bell; also maítamua.

ma i te í du su ki, *n., lit.*, material for washing the face; soap.

ma i te í ki pa ki ši, *n., fr.* ite, i, and kipaikiši; a towel. (§ 44).

ma i tí du su ki, *n.*, a contracted form of maiteidusúki commonly used.

ma í ti pe, *n., fr.* itipe; a fall-trap.

ma i tsi mú a, *n., fr.* tsimua; ornamental metallic pendants.

ma i tskí ti, *n., fr.* itskiti; a scissors.

ma i tu lí i ki pki ti, *fr.* itulii and maikipkiti, and synonymous with the latter.

mak [wək], a prefix to verbs denoting opposition, reciprocity, etc. See maki and § 153.

ma ká, *n.*; my daughter (form of address).

ma ka dĩ šta [-ri-], *n., fr.* ka-dišta; a child, a young person.

ma ka dĩ šta i'' dāk udsi, *n., fr.* makadišta and dakudsi; a child's swing, or swinging cradle; an arrangement, for rocking children, made of ropes and blankets and suspended from a beam. See maidakudsi.

ma ka dĩ šta ke, *n.*; a doll. See ke.

ma ka dĩ šta ma tse, *n.* (ma-tse, a man); a young boy.

mak

ma ka dĩ šta mi a, *n.* (mia, a woman); a young girl.

ma ka dĩ šta ti, *n.* See Local Names.

ma' ka lipí ta mi [-wi], *n.*; hail.

ma ká ptsi, *v. t.*, 1st pers. of dakáptsi.

mā ka ta, *n.*; large fruit, particularly plums.

mák i, *v. i.*, and adverbial prefix, same as mak.

mák i a, *v. i., fr.* maki; to contest, to oppose, to struggle with one another; to play a game in which opposite sides are taken.

mák i a pé, *adj.*; checkered, cross-barred.

mák i a pé ke, *v. t.*; to checker, to ornament with intersecting lines.

mák i á ti dĩ e'', *v. i., fr.* tidic; to run a contested race.

mák i á ti dĩ e'' ke, *v. t., fr.* tidieke; to cause to run in contest, i. e., to race horses, to have a horse-race.

mak i dá kši, *n., fr.* kidakši; a very young child, one tied up in a bundle (as these Indians usually carry children until they are about six months old); the bundle and child together.

ma ki dé kša, *n., fr.* kidekša; an excessive vomiting; a sickness characterized by prolonged or excessive vomiting.

ma ki dĩ ki, *n., fr.* kidiki; a hammer.

ma ki dĩ ši, *n., fr.* kidiši; a dance.

ma kí du mi [+wi], *n., fr.* kídumi; a numeral.

ma ki du tskí ši, *n., fr.* kidutskiši; a lot of washed clothes.
