W$E$ bave to noto another week of general quiet in most departments, operations being marked by the same features as for some weeks back. Flour has continued to arrive freely, and the market has been steadily on the decline. Wheat has come forward more abundantly since the tendency to decline. Pesse and Oats still more promptly for export to Britain, at rates varying little from former quotations. Pork and Butter have engaged little attention, the downward tendency in the British provision market checking any speculation. Pot Ashes continue steady at generally unchanged rates; but Pearls have continued to decline, closing lower than for months past. Flotr.-Receipts have continued heavy and without any improvement in the demand. Prices have steadily receded, marking a further decline on the week of 20 c . to 25 c . on the leading descriptions; indeed, so fruitless have been all efforts at selling in quantity, that holders have had no option but to hold till a demand springs up from some quarter, or prices recede to a point at which buyers may feel safe in operating. There are but retail sales of the higher grades, at rates within the range of quotations. Supers sell only in single hundreds or broken lots; closing rates being $\$ 620$ to $\$ 6.35$, the latter for choice and strong. No. 2 and lower grades are for the time equally dull at a proportionate decline. Bag Flour keeps pace with the general decline, and is a dragging sale at $\$ 340$ to $\$ 8.50$, only the better samples engag ing attention.
Oatmani-Recejpts continuesmall, and the demand fair at former rates.

Whent-Rates are nominal in the absence of transactions, although we have more arrivals of U.C. Spring than for some time previously, but, being mostly direct to millers, are not placed on the market.

Pras-Prices continue without notable change, but transactions are fewer.
OATB-Are in fair supply, and more freely at former rates.
Pork-Remains unchanged; retail sales continue to be made at quotations, but there is no wholesale demand whatever.
Cutmeate, Lard, \&c-Are very dull; indeed there is no demand at present for any description of the products of the Hog.
Butter-The drooping tone of the British market has quite prevented any animation in this market. Receipts and stocks are small, and holders having paid a high price for what they have bought, are not disposed to make any concession in price, as the country merchants and operators are holding in most instances for high prices, and many profess to be sanguine of an advance on late rates. There is, however, a very considerable accumulation rapidly augmenting every town and village in the West and even in the farmers' hands, and with the prospect of an unprecedentedly large make this Fall all over this continent, and a declining tendency in every article of Provisions, the best informed shippers evince no dieposition to engage in operations in an article which all must regard at a dangerously high price at present
AsHEs.-Pots remain steady, and with a feeling that the British market has touched bottom for the present, there is a slightly improved demand, although without any change in price. Pearls are dall, and almost nominal; receipts are ample for the wants of the trade, and the tendency in price is still down. wards.
