

## SELKIRK, MAN.

Selkirk is more than just the self-described "catfish capital of North America." It's a gem of the Red River, surrounded by lakes, rivers and forests. It's an unpretentious place, with rodeos and fishing in the summer and hockey in the winter. Recommended by Clinton Martin.



# ALGONOUIN PROVINCIAL PARK, ONT.

At 7630 km<sup>2</sup>, Algonquin Park is roughly one and a half times the size of P.E.I. This is the busiest provincial park in Canada, due largely to the nearness of Toronto and Ottawa. Children from those cities grow up with memories of canoeing and fishing in the park, while the paintings of Tom Thompson have publicized the park's natural beauty to the rest of the country. ### THE CITY OF OUÉBEC

The only walled city in North America, location of the first permanent settlement by Europeans, Québec is historic and beautiful. Most famous as the site of the Battle of the Plains of Abraham in 1759, which shaped the future of North America, the Citadel on the St. Lawrence has always been one of the continent's most striking places to visit. ### CARAQUET, N.B.

The peaceful village of Caraquet offers a perfect blend of tourism and cultural activities, played out amidst breathtaking scenery. The harbour area is a major tourist attraction as are the Acadian festivities, the beaches and the museums. In 2003, Canadian Heritage named Caraquet the Cultural Capital of Canada for its commitment to the development of arts and culture. Recommended by André-Marc Lanteigne.



#### CAVENDISH, P.E.I.

In September 1864, P.E.I. hosted a conference that would earn the island the moniker of "The Birthplace of Confederation." P.E.I. is also the birthplace of L. M. Montgomery, author of Anne of Green Gables and one of Canada's most successful writers. The Cavendish area is famous for its beaches, gentle seas, red sand, potatoes and hospitality. ### GROS MORNE NATIONAL PARK, NFLD.

Gros Morne is the west coast of the East Coast. Foggy mountains, lush forests and a view of the Gulf of St. Lawrence all combine to make this a place of singular, otherworldly beauty. Recommended by John Griffin.

Halifax has been the port of entry for more immigrants than any other place in Canada. For so many families, the Canadian Experience started here.
