CALL FOR INQUIRY RESPECTING SERVICEMEN EXPOSED TO AGENT ORANGE—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Yesterday the United States Senate voted 98 to zero in favour of federally financed medical treatment of Vietnam war veterans who were exposed to the defoliant Agent Orange. Last January 27 the Minister of National Defence (Mr. Lamontagne) evaded questions regarding the damaging effects of Agent Orange on servicemen stationed at Gagetown base in New Brunswick by implying that, since U.S. experience had not yet been settled, there was no reason why the Canadian problem should be remedied. In light of the recent progress made in the United States I move, seconded by the hon. member for Fundy-Royal (Mr. Corbett):

That the Minister of National Defence immediately set up a strictly federallysponsored inquiry to determine whether servicemen employed at Gagetown during this testing have in any way been affected by Agent Orange and, if they have, that the minister introduce legislation that would provide medical treatment financing for these people.
