SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or who has been married for three years, and who is at least 21 years of age, and who is a Canadian citizen, or who is a naturalized Canadian citizen, and who is a resident of the Northwest Territories, may apply for a homestead.
