## Home Helps

When sewing your own down on a coat or bonnet, stitch both edges to a strip of soft satin ribbon. The stitching does not show, and the down wears much longer.

When a cork has fallen inside a bottle, if enough strong ammonia to float the cork is poured into the bottle and allowed to stand a few days, it will break up the cork so that it can be taken out easily.

If stamps have become glued together, lay a thin paper on them and run a hot iron over it.

If the neck of a sweater becomes stretched too wide, dip the neck part in clear warm water, wring lightly and hang up to dry. It will resume its original shape and size.

Cut a dress shield in two pieces, bind the raw edge and tuck under the baby's fancy bib. It will absorb the moisture in the open air and the wrinkles will disappear.

Take a hot iron and smooth over the tissue paper pattern on the cloth to be cut. It will cling to the goods and make plus unnecessary.

When the gas range needs cleaning, remove the loose parts and place them in the furnace on a good bed of coals.

If a coat lined with fur is wrinkled, take a wet sponge and go over it thoroughly, then hang on a clothes-hanger in the open air and the wrinkles will disappear.

## The Nursery

Care of the Teeth.

There are certain periods in baby's life that we have been taught to look forward to with dread. One of these is the teething period, and many young mothers worry for months because baby may cut his teeth during hot weather.

If your baby is the kind I have been dealing with in these columns, the normal, healthy baby, you need have no more fear of his teething-outting than you have of his learning to talk.

It is a perfectly natural process and, although it does often cause the wee man some suffering, there is never any cause for alarm. Some babies cut their teeth much earlier than others, but it is never wise to force the growth of teeth.

Between the ages of four and eight months the two middle teeth in the upper or lower jaw appear. And from then on little white spots show up on either side of these pairs until when baby is a year or a little older he has four teeth in each jaw.

When he is 18 months old the front double teeth are usually down. Next come the four eye-teeth, and the four back double teeth, completing the milk set.

Many mothers do not realize the importance of looking after the first set of teeth. Because the temporary teeth are so close together, they do not require careful attention. The milk set lasts for six or eight years, and then for the next six years, they are gradually replaced by the permanent set.

When you realize that the condition of the permanent teeth depends on the care of the first set, you will understand why the care of baby's teeth should begin when he is a year old.

The permanent set are under the push of the milk teeth out, and if there is any decay in the first set it may reach down and affect the coming teeth.

Clean baby's teeth with a swab of absorbent cotton, wet with boracic acid solution. Work in behind the teeth and try to keep them thoroughly clean.

It is surprising how soon dark stains appear on the teeth of a young child. After the child begins to eat food, that is, leave particles between the teeth, use a silk thread to clean them.

Children's gums are so tender that they should be given a small amount of boracic acid solution to take care of their own teeth. Good teeth play an important part in keeping up the general health that mothers must exercise special care in supervising their condition.
