The blue and white squad have to win this game to tie McGill for the Intercollegiate honors, and the game will be played under the worst possible conditions. The Kingston City grounds are poorly drained and are a sea of mud after a steady downpour of a few hours. Varsity's wetness will leave them in a awful shape, and the speedy Varsity fourteen will be hampered not a little. The Press-ers will be the strongest contenders on the wet going, but Varsity should be able to pull out a win.

Jack Maynard announced before the team left for Kingston yesterday morning that he would get into the game, but when they arrive in Kingston, and Coach Wright sees the muddy pond, it is a safe bet that he will keep the great general on the sidelines, not taking any chances of putting Jack out of business for the McGill game.

A well man is worth more than a sick man from a purely business point of view. A contented, happy man will do more and better work than one who is discontented and unhappy. Sickness is a material liability, health a realizable commercial asset. Employers of large numbers of human machines are realizing the surprising fact that, as a cold business proposition, it pays, not in sentiment but in dollars, to take good care of their employees. Business men are learning that well-fed, well-clothed, well-rested, well-lighted, well-ventilated quarters and on schedules arranged in accordance with our modern knowledge of psychology and physiology, actually turn out more work and better work than underpaid, discontented help working under conditions of discomfort and insanitary conditions.

For these reasons large corporations are spending money liberally in play grounds, rest-rooms, libraries, gymnasiums, sanitary lunch-rooms, moving-picture shows, safety devices, ventilating systems and similar devices for the well-being and enjoyment of their employees. If one asks these men why they are doing these things, they will disclaim any charitable or philanthropic motives. "This isn't charity," says a firm "we want that clearly understood. This is simply good business thing we can do to make the people who do our work at ease in mind and management just as we regard fire-insurance, improved machinery and labor-saving devices."

The conservation of the health of employees will be a fundamental principle of good business management in the future, says The Journal of the American Medical Association, and

The World's Smallest Business "Building."

What is believed to be the smallest business "building" in the world is located at 2 Light street, Baltimore, Md. This building, for it is a building inasmuch as a building permit was required from the city authorities before it could be erected, stands on a triangular-shaped lot, has a frontage of 2 ft. 7 in., a depth of 1 ft. 5 in., and is 2 ft. tall. The ground upon which it stands is a remnant left when Light street was widened following the great fire of 1904. At that time the city bought all of the lots fronting on the street, as it was then, took what land was necessary for the reconstructed street and sold the remnants at public auction. The remnants upon which the smallest "building" stands was sold to Joseph P. Jarboe, who in common with adjacent owners, enjoys the privilege of using a portion of the area way in the rear.
