

Health and Happiness As Business Assets. A well man is worth more than a sick man, from a purely business point of view. A contented, happy woman will do more and better work than one who is discontented and work than one whi do more and petter work than ope who is discontented and unhappy. Sickness is a material liability, health a realizable commercial asset. These are facts realized by life insurance companies, which have found that they can increase their dividends fast-er by cutting down the death size.

companies, which have found that they can increase their dividends fast-er by cutting down the death-rate than by increasing sales or by re-ducing expenses. Employers of large numbers of hu-man machines are realizing the sur-prising fact that, as a cold business proposition, it pays, not in sentiment but in dollars, to take good care of their employes. Business men are learning that well-fed, well-clothed men and women, working in well-light-ed, well-ventilated quarters and on schedules arranged in accordance with our modern knowledge of psychology and physiology, actually turn out more work and better work than underpaid, discontented help, working under un-comfortable and insanitary conditions. For these reasons large corporations are spending money liberally in play grounds, rest-rooms, libraries, gymäa-siums, sanitary kunch-rooms, moving-picture shows, safety devices for the well-being and enjoyment of their employes. If one asks these men why they are doing these things, they will disclaim any charitable or philanthro-pic motives. "This isn't charity," says one firm "we want that clearly under-stood. This is simply good business management and common sense. Any-thing we can do to make the people who do our work at ease in mind and body we regard as good business man-agement, just as we regard fire-insurwho do our work at ease in hind and body we regard as good business man-agement, just as we regard fire-insur-ance, improved machinery and laborsaving devices."

The conservation of the health of mployes will be a fundamental prin-ciple of good business management in the future, says The Journal of the American Medical Association, and



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
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
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
