

129 CARLOADS CITY YARD DEMAND FOR GOOD BUTCHERS

Sheep, Lambs and Calves Sell Readily—Hog Market Firm and Unchanged.

Receipts of live stock at the city cattle market were 129 cars, composed of 2304 cattle, 1572 hogs, 1700 sheep and lambs and 2 horses.

Exporters. Trade in exporters is of a very limited nature, only a very few odd lots being offered for sale, but the supply is restricted, it is fully equal to the demand.

Butchers. The butcher trade generally showed a decidedly better feeling than the very perceptible advance in price is noticeable. The better quality of the stock is a drag on the trade generally.

Feeders and Stockers. The demand for good feeders and stockers was very heavy.

Milk Cows. Really good milk cows and springers were in demand and sold at unchanged prices, ranging from \$45 to \$90.

Hogs. The deliveries of hogs yesterday were very large, some 1700. The bulk of these were sent to the city.

Market Notes. A feature of the city market yesterday was the car loads of western Manitoba cattle brought in for sale.

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PRINCE IS MOOSE HUNTING PREVIOUS TO U. S. WHIRL

Slips Away From Halifax to New Brunswick Bush—Elaborate Program for American Visit.

Moncton, N.B., Oct. 5.—Prince Louis of Battenberg has gone into the Canadian woods in New Brunswick to hunt moose and caribou.

The trip was very quietly arranged, only a few knowing of the prince's intention previous to his departure.

He was anxious to secure a good moose head as a souvenir of his Canadian trip, and, learning it was only a few hours' journey to the famous forests of Canada, the prince, accompanied by Halifax friends, took the night L.C.R. express from Halifax on Tuesday and was met at Petticoat by the Daily Meadow.

The prospects of good sport for the prince are excellent. The prince will remain in the woods for several days.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Announcement was made at the United States navy department of the tentative program arranged for the entertainment of the British squadron, under command of Prince Louis of Battenberg.

The prince's squadron will arrive at Annapolis Nov. 1, where it will be received by Rear-Admiral Evans with the battle-ships and armored cruisers of the North Atlantic fleet.

Nov. 2 Admiral Evans will entertain Prince Louis and officers at dinner. On the third they will visit Washington, and on Nov. 4 a reception will be given at the White House by the president, at 3 p.m., to be followed by dinner.

The arrival of the British squadron at New York on the ninth will be followed next day by the British squadron.

HORROR FOLLOWS HORROR NEW YORK TENEMENT FIRE

Three Children Burn to Death and Several Firemen Are Injured.

New York, Oct. 5.—Three children were burned to death, their parents rescued and taken in a drying condition to St. Mary's Hospital; five other tenants went to the hospital suffering from burns and two firemen were hurt in a fire in a four-story tenement house in Reid-avenue, Brooklyn, late last night.

The dead are: Charles Donally, aged 9; Robert Donally, aged 5; Katherine Donally, aged 12.

Other incidents of the fire were the birth of a child while the mother was being removed from the burning building.

The hallways of the building were filled with flames and smoke and every occupant of the building was asleep when the flames were discovered by Wm. Teaz and Umas Nugent, firemen who were off duty.

While hurrying to the fire Chief Croker's automobile was upset and the chief was thrown out and badly shaken up.

The general board of the new Canadian Bible society, which is the head of all the Bible societies in Canada, held a meeting which lasted from early yesterday morning till midnight at the board-room in the Upper Canada Bible society building on Yonge-street.

The meeting dealt with Bible distribution from coast to coast, and a considerable portion of the day's work was the adoption of the new constitution of the Canadian Bible society, which will be at once issued to the members.

The Bible is being distributed in thirty languages in the North-west Territories, and the society has 1200 branches in Canada.
