IS SAID THAT SHE IS A MAN AFTER 34 YEARS IN DRESSES

Remarkable Story from Brooklyn—Brought Up as a Girl and Never Doubted Sex.

New York, Oct. 24.—After living thirty-four years as girl and woman, May Best, who resides in an exclusive district in Brooklyn, has been told that she is a man.

The revelation is one of the strangest medical men in the city recall. During the thirty-four years of "Miss Best's" life as a woman, the many little masculine traits which she strove to suppress were not accepted by her as even a shadow of a warning of the revelation that she was a man.

As "Miss" Best, she had been born and reared in a Virginia family. As a child she played with her dolls as did the little girls in the neighborhood.

She used to watch the boys playing ball and a strong desire would overcome her to get out and roam with them, but her parents told her that little girls did not do such things, but stayed at home and made dolls' clothes.

When she grew up she was sent to a boarding school for girls and completed her education there. The jointed girls' clubs, and with them devoted her time to the fads and fancies of dress.

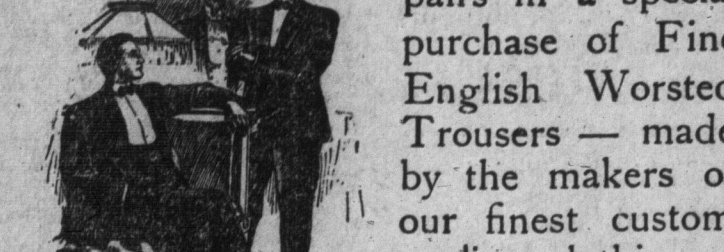
The Austrian Hebrew Ladies' Aid Society held their annual ball in George's Hall last night. About two hundred guests enjoyed themselves.
