

CLOSE CALL FOR THE CAPS.

Varsity Beaten in Semi-Final for Canadian Rugby Championship by 7 Points to 3—Students Scored in First Half and Rough Riders in Second.

Ottawa City's Rough Riders defeated Varsity in the semi-final football match for the Canadian Rugby championship Saturday afternoon at Rosedale by 7 points to 3, at half time the students were ahead 3 to 0, but then supporters of the visitors were quite sanguine of victory. The day was fine and clear, with a nice breeze blowing from the west, and Old Rosedale peeping at intervals through the clouds. The game was perfect and the crowds in the grand stand, and the arrangements admirable. Everyone was big and around the fences were afforded unobstructed view. About 2000 witnessed the contest, including 1000 from Hamilton and the same number from Ottawa, the last contingent coming especially to back the Rough Riders. So anxious were Capital supporters to get their money on the game that as long odds as 5 to 1 were offered in down town resorts at noon. The ruling figure at the clubhouse before the start was 3 to 1, with the even money that Ottawa would double the bet. At half time 5 to 4 was offered by the visitors, while at 1 to 1 was offered by the Rough Riders.

GORBETT STILL THE FAVORITE.

Speculators Getting Their Money Down on Tomorrow's Battle in New York.
