CHICAGO WHEAT ACTIVE

May Option at One Time Rose a Cent and a Quarter

On That Board, But Eased Off Before the Close—The Market Looks Like a Forced One—Liverpool Stronger

Chicago Corn Also Fluctuated Considerably—Notes and Gossip.

Tuesday Evening, Jan. 24. Exports at New York to-day: Flour 1,000 barrels and 29,917 sacks; wheat 134,000 bushels.

Liverpool wheat receipts the past three days, 236,000 cwt., including 151,000 cwt. of American. Corn same time, 145,000 cwt.

Chicago's wheat market was an active one to-day. The professionals are evidently attempting to extend the boom from Wall Street to the Chicago pit, and are using all sorts of arguments to advance prices.

Liverpool makes futures to-day advanced 1/2 cent, and may have advanced 1/2 cent more at Chicago, but lost most of the gain.
