Washington, Nov. 6 .- According to the repartment, the postal revenues for the year are shown to be \$95,021,384, and the expenditures \$101,435,260, leaving a deficit of \$6,413.885. During the past year the revenues increased \$6,008,765, and the expenditures \$3,778,752.
