TORONTO.DOMVILLE STILL ATTACKS  
READS LETTERS A LONGERDeclares That Senator Kerr's Bill re  
Insurance Cut Ground From  
Under Him.Ottawa, April 25.—(Staff Special).—  
Senator Domville continued his series  
of attacks on the Mutual Reserve Fund  
Life Association in the upper house to-  
day. He read several letters containing  
serious charges against the company.One policy-holder wrote that his insur-  
ance was made on the understanding  
that his premium would be a certain  
amount. After ten years that amount  
was doubled. In several letters the  
charge was made that the premiums  
ate up the amount of the policies.Others assured him that numbers of  
people in Canada were watching his  
"splendid fight" in this matter. Others  
again expressed their sense of the need  
of greater protection for the Canadian  
policyholders.One wrote that the company owed his  
mother's death to its policy. On his  
father's policy of \$2000, he charged  
that the company were paying out  
class dividends while at the same time  
they were representing in other direc-  
tions that they had no money.Senator Domville analyzed the report  
brought down in the senate. He showed  
how the company had in force in Can-  
ada in 1903, and in 1904, a total of  
amounting to \$34,000,000. By expiry and  
lapse there was \$45,000,000. They ran  
down from \$38,000,000 in 1897 till to-day  
they had some \$3,000,000 in force. In four  
years they received as an income in  
Canada the sum of \$1,000,000. In the  
twelve years they had received in in-  
come from all sources \$78,654,208, and  
had paid out \$49,748,316 to the insured.  
The rest had gone as commissions, in-  
surance fees, salaries, etc. That accounted  
for the terrible state the company was in.Senator Dandurand suggested that as  
they were all interested in the insured,  
Mr. Domville should as soon as possible  
submit to the chamber what he pro-  
posed for the relief of the policyholders.Mr. Kerr had produced a bill, and it  
would be well to have Mr. Domville's  
scheme, so as to consider them both to-  
gether.Senator Domville said the senators  
were judges. When the committee re-  
ported, then would be the time to dis-  
cuss what related to the bill. The  
bill had cut the ground from under his  
feet. The matter stood over.Sir Mackenzie Bowell moved for a  
return showing particulars of the busi-  
ness done by the Pacific cable since it  
opened. Referring to the deficits, a  
portion of which Canada would have  
to bear, he said he had always thought  
that if this cable were not managed in  
the interest of the eastern provinces, it  
was so managed as not to  
become a paying concern. He  
urged that the Canadian government  
should take decisive action to insist  
upon this cable being managed in a  
business manner.Senator Scott replied that the cable  
could hardly be expected to pay the  
first year. Canada's share of the de-  
ficit was \$25,000. One great difficulty  
arose from the unfair advantages given  
the Eastern Extension Cable Company  
by the British government. The cable

ment.KINGSTON'S SENSATION.  
Plot Said to Have Been Discovered  
to Free Desperate Prisoners.Kingston, April 25.—From time to  
time since the evening of May 28, 1900,  
when that trio of desperadoes, Walsh,  
Nolan and Dullman, the Welsh and  
Canal dynamiters, were placed with-  
in the walls of Kingston penitentiary  
to serve their life sentence an uneasy  
feeling has swept over the country  
for plots have been discovered on sev-  
eral occasions to bring about their re-  
lease, and for over two years a special  
guard did duty outside the walls at  
night.One year after the men were im-  
prisoned the police received word to  
be on the look-out for five men. These  
came here and put up at one of the  
hotels. They were shadowed and pre-  
cautions taken and they found it  
wisely to depart without their baggage.  
Another attempt was made some time  
after, but was bungled. Then all at-  
tempts from the outside apparently  
ceased.A new plan was tried a few months  
ago, but it also was nipped in the bud.  
And news of this had just leaked out.  
It appears that one day two "Sisters  
of Mercy" as usual visited the peni-  
tentiary. One of these was seen to  
give a package to one of the dynamit-  
ers, but just at the time no suspicion  
was aroused. When the "Sisters" had  
left the man was searched, and what  
was evidently the remains of a large  
package of money was found conceal-  
ed in the lining of the package.An investigation was set on foot,  
and it was found that the "Sisters"  
were a bogus one, and that they suc-  
ceeded in deceiving the other as to  
their real character, and used her to  
obtain an entrance to the prison.Rochester, and further investigation  
is said to have showed that the money  
was furnished by an English woman  
in New York, wife of an Italian.So far as is known nothing further  
was done in the matter, and the three  
dynamiters are safe and sound within
