### SUSPENDED

#### MEMBERS.

Toronto, Ont., July 21.-Chief Justice Meredith this morning delivered judgment in the case of the Select Knights, who appealed against the decision of the local master at St. Catharines, making them contributories to the dues and assessments levied under the winding-up order. The appellants claimed that they were not liable, having ceased to be members before the collapse of the society by reason of non-payment of dues. Their names, however, appeared on the books as suspended members, and they had not formally retired according to the pre-

scribed form The chief justice set aside the master's ruling and ordered a reference back to him for further consideration. At the same time the chief justice states that a suspended member is none the less a member, and any liability to pay dues and assessments continues, not only as to those payable at the time of suspension, but also as to dues and assessments incurred after suspension, and before the default has resulted by the operation of the rules in his ceasing to be a member.
