

ETERNAL CONFLICT IN THE BALKANS

Discussions Between Turks,
Greeks and Slavs.

RELIGION AND EDUCATION

How and Why the Greeks Applied to
the Turkish Government
for Protection.

Washington, June 13.—A conflict between Turk and Slav and Greek, according to keen students of the problem, is always existent in the Balkans. As to the actual state of affairs there, our knowledge here in the west is very imperfect, to say the least. What the Macedonians have done, are doing, and will do, is a matter that was seldom taken up in the past, and only lately, since 1896, have we taken a general interest in their troubles. The Greeks are not false to their old ideas, as they have been accused. They are oppressed and cheated by the Bulgarians and Servians, the Bulgarians particularly. Therefore, some accurate information on those countries is useful.

"The Greeks are always upholding nobly the banner of Hellenic culture," said a prominent diplomat. "They have done the best they could under the adverse circumstances which seem to have fallen to their lot ever since they lost the supremacy in the world centuries and centuries ago. This best can only be verified by those who travel in those countries and see for themselves."

"It is very difficult to form an exact and impartial idea of the condition of things in Macedonia today, on account of the many rough conflicts of races which have been going on for many years in its provinces. Statistics of those countries are deceptive and faulty. They are planned in a slipshod manner and according to the whims of their author. Many peasants, throughout Macedonia could not tell, if asked, their nationality. They do not know because the sovereignty over their provinces is always disputed. For a long time all the Christians of Macedonia were dependent on the Greek Church. Now there is a Bulgarian Church also. Neither the one nor the other, I know on good authority, corresponds to ethnological divisions."

"The Greek patriarchate still comprises Servians, Kouzo-Valaques and Bulgarians. The Bulgarian enclaves, or local religious jurisdictions, there are of its strictly national character, comprises thousands and thousands of Servians. The sole national criterion is the school. There general education is not obligatory—it depends upon private initiative. The love and progress of instruction denote the moral and civilizing value of a race. Therefore, knowing the number and importance of the Christian school in Macedonia, we can estimate with perfect exactness the material and intellectual force of the divers contending races."

"I have here some interesting facts regarding schools in Greece and Bulgaria," continued the diplomat. "In the vilayet of Salonika, Greece, which comprises 46 cazas, or districts, there are in all 171 schools, subdivided into primary and secondary schools, and schools for girls, with 1,360 teachers and over 42,000 pupils. These are divided between the four Christian races—the Greek, the Serbian, the Roumanian and the Bulgarian. There are 521 Greek schools, with 32,334 students; 319 Bulgarian schools, with 9,544 students; 21 Serbian schools, with 522 students, and 10 Roumanian schools, with 383 students. "Greek schools are found in 21 districts, Bulgarian in 17, Serbian in 16 and Roumanian in 4. Out of a total number of 25 districts Greek schools are lacking in only two, Kavadar and Rasik, where only Bulgarian schools are found. In the vilayet of Monastir, which comprises fifteen districts, there are in all 790 schools with 38,834 students."

"These schools are instruments of national propaganda, especially the Bulgarian, Roumanian and Serbian institutions, and therefore they are created and helped only in most cases, by governmental resources. Some years ago the British Government sent for statistics on the subject and Mr. Blount, then British Consul-general at Salonika, wrote: 'The importance of the most of the Bulgarian schools is diminished, I think, by the importance of the sums sent from Bulgaria, oriental Roumelia, perhaps even from Russia, for their sustenance. Instruments of official propaganda, the schools have a factitious clientele recruited by large pecuniary subsidies. All these schools are quite artificial—they have no roots in Macedonia.'"

"On the other hand, the condition of Greek schools is quite different. They are due to private initiative, and are attended freely without any aid, pecuniary, moral or physical. The most obstinate Bulgarians are forced to recognize this side of the question. 'It is impossible not to be struck by

the educational superiority of the Greek race. It denotes an intellectual value and activity which the contending races are far from possessing in the same degree. 'It has often been alleged, too, that the Greeks have allied themselves with the Turks. This is not true, and the rumor has been forged by the Bulgarians and their devoted friends. The course of events proves just the opposite. The Bulgarian comitads, or propagandists, have started an artificial movement in Macedonia just in a country where the divers national interests are in constant and violent conflict. 'They wanted the Greeks to take up arms and help them, so that they might present a strictly Bulgarian movement, as a Macedonian revolt to the rest of the world. The Greeks have not been so simple as to be caught in this snare. The comitads at once put into execution their infernal plan to extinguish the Greek race, that strong and influential object to their selfish and greedy intentions. Taxing the Greeks and murdering men and women without distinction brought terror and calamity to the peaceful and disarmed Macedonians. What would the disinterested Bulgarian want, the Macedonians and their devoted friends, to take care of their own existence. Most naturally they applied for protection to the ruling government. 'They asked the Turkish authorities to save them from these strange beings who pretended to free them from the Turkish rule by overtaking, plundering and murdering them. Is that an alliance with the Turks? Did the American citizens ally themselves with the Bulgarians? The Greeks were guarded and protected by Turkish soldiers during the Armenian massacres? It is exactly the same with the Greeks. There is but only one difference—that the Americans were guarded and faithfully protected while the Greeks were not. 'The religious dissensions of the different and antagonistic races will some day solve the problem. It will not be many decades ere the Greeks will become a more independent people, as the Bulgarians, Roumanians and other subservient races be placed once forever under the drastic rule of either Russia or Turkey. These are the only two nations that could cope with the situation, and very likely Turkey will have the preference."

DENUNCIATION OF MANITOBA GOVT.

Sharp Criticism by the Retiring
President of the Methodist
Conference.

Winnipeg, June 13.—At the Methodist conference in Neepawa President Saunby denounced the Manitoba Government. In retiring from office he spoke briefly, looking to the problems of the future, he had to face a corrupt Government. He had heard young Conservatives say that they would not cast another vote for the present Government on account of its alliance with the liquor traffic. He saw a new statesmanship arising, which, he trusted, would have courage to go to defeat for principle, and fight for moral right. He feared there would be one of the most heated and perhaps vilest contests in the next provincial election. If they dared to go to defeat they would eventually triumph. Men who allied themselves with unrighteousness and intemperance would be swept away. The old guard in both parties must go. Men were needed who would be called to take their places in the fight for righteousness and truth where it means loss of all.

Conference yesterday made an almost open declaration of war against the Roblin Government on account of the license policy. A resolution was adopted as follows: "That this conference deplores the enormous development of the liquor traffic in this Province, protests against the policy of the present official administration in granting licenses in the interests of the traffic; approves heartily of the democratic principle of local option by majority, and pledges itself to support the next election; lays it on the conscience of its membership to scan closely the moral qualifications of party candidates."

The Winnipeg Telegram defends the Government and challenges the President of the conference to produce proof of the corruption charged.
