HANDWRITING OF AUTHORS.

Charlotte Bronte's handwriting seemed to have been traced with a needle, and the penmanship of Bryant was aggressive, well formed and decidedly pleasing to the eye. microscopic eyes were needed to read it. Longfellow wrote a bold, open black hand, which was the delight of printers.

Joaquin Miller writes such a bad hand that he often becomes puzzled over his own work. The handwriting of Capt. Marryatt letters from Germany to the Empress Josephine were at first taken for rough maps of the seat of war.

Much of Carlyle's temperament may be read in his handwriting. He wrote a patient, crabbed, oddly emphasized hand. The chirography of Walter Scott, Leigh the author's habit of writing with blue ures and interlineations, made his copy a burden to his published. Byron's handwriting was a mere scrawl. His additions in his proofs often exceeded in volume the original copy. To one of his poems, which contained only 400 lines in the original,
