Number Below That of the Nine Preceding Years.

Montreal, Jan. 10.-The financial disturbance that swelled the losses so heavily in the United States during 1907 extended to Canada to a certain extent, but the effect was much less severe, and owing to the different banking system in the Dominion there were no banking failures whatever. Commercial failures as reported by R. G. Dun & Co., numbered 1,278 against 1,184 in 1906, and liabilities were \$13,221,259 against \$9,085,773. The number of Canadian insolvencies was not above the average for recent preceding years; in fact, it was below the figures for nine of the preceding thirteen years. Liabilities, however, were slightly larger than in any year since 1897. Manufacturing failures were 393 in number and \$6,667,452 in amount, against 293 failures last year, when liabilities were \$3,482.511. Trading failures made a much better comparison, being only 847 against 863 in the previous year and \$5,756,651 in amount against \$5,145,142 in 1906. There were 38 other commercial failures involving \$797,156, against 28 failures in the previous year for \$458,120. Comparing the Canadian record according to provinces discloses the fact that liabilities in Quebec increased about \$2,000,000 and in Ontario almost as much. Smaller increases occurred in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Alberta, while liabilities were less than in the previous year in British Columbia, Manitoba of 83 in Manitoba.
