

# Baseball Toronto 1 Baltimore 2 To-day's Trotting For World's Championship Games

## Note and Comment

Thomas Brownlee, president of the Ontario Football Association and an officer of at least a half dozen other athletic organizations, and his bride are back from their delightful honeymoon trip to the Pacific coast. Mr. Brownlee attended the races at Minoru Park, Vancouver, B.C., which he described as first-class. They have 400 horses occupying all the stalls and more are being built. After the spring meeting at Seattle, Wash., the horses race 60 days in Vancouver, and now they are at Victoria for 25 days. The turf game looks promising for the Canadian fair west.

Mr. Brownlee attended last Saturday's lacrosse game at New Westminster, when the champions beat Vancouver 10 to 4, and he describes the field as unique, notably the slope that must work a considerable handicap to visiting teams. Still he thinks the agile Toronto would land the Minto Cup according to the speed and skill the two teams are showing to-day.

Now whom did the schoolmaster see at Seattle? None other than our old friend, Yankee Rogers, Yousef and several other grip artists under names that brought terror to the spectators, but to the familiar eye the wrestlers were the same.

The Toronto and Tecumseh must score at Ottawa and Cornwall to-day otherwise it's good-by to the lacrosse championship as far as this city is concerned for a year. However, Nationals say they'll trim Shamrocks and here's hoping they do.

The Maple Leafs played yesterday like as if they would turn out lucky to lead in the first division, especially their work with the stick was exceedingly mediocre and only our venerable friend Dr. Adkins was the opposition.

The leaders did some better, winning back the double header from the Grays, while Newark also dropped one at Montreal, but there is still that dread full final trip to the east head of the Hustlers, not to mention eight games with the Toronto when it is hoped the last named will show improvement.

Uhlman's victory over Hamburg Belle yesterday at Redville makes it one each for the world's trotting championship. The deciding race is in October.

**The Ward Marathon.**  
The entries will open for the big Ward Marathon on Tuesday next. The new Ward Trophy is one of the finest and largest cups ever offered in the history of amateur sport for competition. The cup stands nearly six feet high, and is beautifully designed in silver. The prizes offered will exceed former years, as a number of gold watches will be given to the first to finish in the big road race. Saturday, Oct. 9, is the date, which has been carefully measured by city health county surveyors. Besides the Ward Marathon, the ten-mile bicycle championship of Canada on has been awarded to the Toronto Club to run that day, and the five-mile motor-cycle championship of Canada will be contested on the same day. Heretofore there were only two schoolboy races, but on this occasion there will be six different races for the pupils. **Ontario Athletic Championships.**  
The Irish-Canadian Athletic Club was awarded the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union championships for the Province of Ontario yesterday, at a conference of representatives held at the Hotel Windsor in President Merrick's office. The meet will be held on the night of Wednesday, Sept. 22, at the Scarborough Beach Grounds. It will be open to registered amateur athletes, irrespective of place of habitation, and is as follows:  
100 yards run, 220 yards run, 440 yards run, 880 yards run, one mile run, one mile relay race (composed of two 220 yards, one 440 yards and one 880 yards), two mile walk, 10 mile run, running broad jump, 16-pound weight, 16-pound shot.  
A gold medal emblematic of the championship of Ontario will be awarded to the winner in each event, a silver and bronze medal to second and third, respectively, except relay race, for which a cup will be given to the winning team. The C.W.A. have notified the secretary that they will sanction the holding of the ten-mile bicycle championship for the Dominion of Canada at the meeting. The Irish-Canadian will put on boys' events of 100 yards and 880 yards handicaps, and a two-mile relay walk.

**NEW RUGS FROM OLD CARPETS.**  
In almost every home there are usually to be found some carpets that because of either shabbiness or extreme ugliness have been banished to the attic. Says Woman's Home Companion for September:

"These can be turned into a most attractive kind of rug. The carpets are sent to a maker, who has them cleaned and revealed and then woven into a soft, fluffy surface of nondescript tone, with a border of contrasting color. These 'fluffy rugs' are among the least of the cheap rugs and do not look cheap at all, and it is a pleasant surprise to see how many useful and charming rugs can be made from a seemingly hopeless old carpet. To have them made costs about one dollar a square yard, making the twelve-by-nine size cost twelve dollars. The maker usually pays express charges one way."
