

NOT BOUND TO ESTABLISH C.N.R. SHOPS IN QUEBEC

Railway's Interests in West Are Distinct From Those in Sister Province.

Speaking as a director of the Canadian Northern Railway, D. B. Hanna repudiates the allegation coming from Quebec, to the effect that his road received a monetary consideration with the understanding that the Canadian Northern shops would be located there. The substance of the Quebec story is that the Great Northern Railway, which was acquired by C. N. R. interests, entered into an agreement with the City of Quebec some years ago to establish its shops in that city. This obligation, the contention is, was assumed by the C. N. R. along with the property. The Quebec and Lake St. John Railway is also controlled by the C. N. R.

The C. N. R., Mr. Hanna says, had no connection with the Quebec road, to which the heads of the C. N. R. are interested in them as individuals. He also holds that Canadian Northern interests are quite distinct from the company's interests further west, and therefore, the plans to build shops in Toronto would not be jeopardized even if the obligations of the old Great Northern to Quebec City were assumed by the company.

GETS THE GOLD MEDAL

There is a great practical future for the wireless telephone. It will be a benefit to science and to the commercial world."

CITY TO SPEND \$11,000 FOR MORE FIRE ENGINES

Two More Needed Because of Expansion, Says Chief Thompson—News of City Hall.

That the city purchase two more steam fire engines, bringing the number to ten, was a recommendation made by the civic fire and light committee yesterday. Funds for the purchase of three engines were voted in 1905, since which time only one engine has been bought.

In the opinion of the committee, and the Chief of Police, the growth of the city makes the fresh acquisitions desirable. The cost will be about \$11,000. It is the chief's intention to replace the old Bousquet engine at Brockton station with a new engine, and to place the other in the new Port-Avenue station, when built. The Bousquet engine has been kept in reserve.

The matter came up when Aid. Baird pointed out that there was no steam engine in the seventh ward, and that the fire companies made protection necessary. The whole district north of Queen and west of John-street had to depend on the engines in the Adelaide and Portland-street halls, he said. He asked for another engine early in the year, but had been refused.

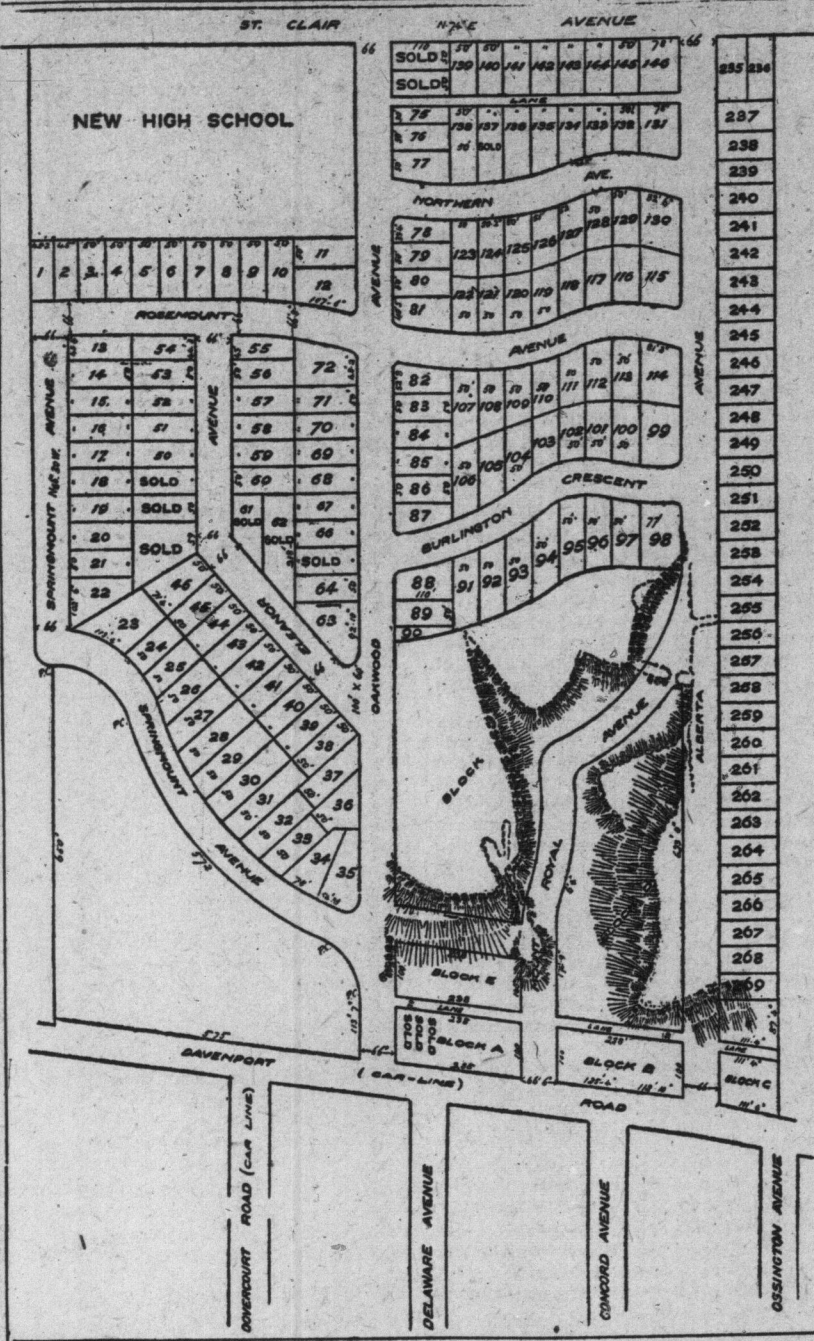
