IS THE OLD ORCHARD WORTH RENOVATING? Some Pointers from the Provincial Horticulturist of N. B. on the Best Methods.

In reply to a query as to whether an old orchard is worth renovating, A. J. Burney, provincial horticulturist of New Brunswick, says that if the trees are not more than thirty-five years of age, have not been allowed to develop their bearing wood too high up, and are not too badly broken, thru disease and neglect, the task of putting them in a profitable condition is comparatively simple. Undoubtedly, there are some orchards which, although they have never received any care, being covered with moss and lichen, and yet strong, thrifty and in a condition to yield handsome returns, under proper treatment. To renovate such orchards proceed as follows: 1. Remove all dead and broken limbs, taking care to leave as neat and short stubs as possible.

operations. Repeat next year with modified pruning. The first season's work will result in increased vigor of the trees, cleaner, but probably not more fruit. The second season the fruit will show a decided improvement over that of the first year, and in the third year, but not until then, you may expect the orchard to be in a good condition and to bear heavily.

Remember the results cannot be accomplished in one year only, but there will be improvement each year, if you do the work thoroughly. The treatment outlined above has never failed to bring satisfactory results, where properly applied. It is useless to undertake this work unless you are prepared to exercise care, patience and thoroughness in all the operations.

70 CARS AT UNION YARDS MEDIUM CATTLE HIGHER

Best Grades Steady at Last Week's Quotations—Sheep, Lambs and Calves Easy—Hogs \$9.40.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Yards were 70 cars, consisting of 1475 cattle, 20 hogs, 15 sheep and 35 calves. The quality of fat cattle generally was medium with a few good to choice lots and loads among them. The bulk of the cattle should have been fed two months longer.

When the quality of the cattle is considered, the prices were fully 10c to 15c better than on Monday last. Trade was good, and as the day advanced grew perceptibly stronger, and dealers stated that prices closed fully 20c per cwt. higher than in the morning.

Export steers at \$8.50 to \$12.50; export heifers, \$8 to \$8.50; export bulls, \$6 to \$8 per cwt. Butchers. Prime picked lots of butchers, good enough to export, \$6.75 to \$7; loads of good, \$6 to \$6.50; medium, \$5.75 to \$6; common, \$5 to \$5.50 for canners and common cows.

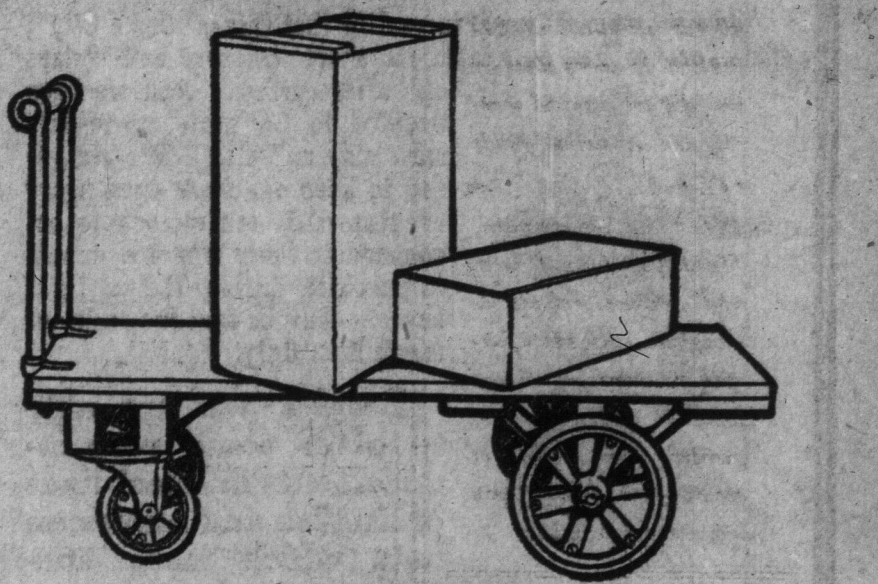
