# **FAMOUS FOOT RACES OF FIFTY YEARS AGO**

FURST RACED\_Ornery, Thinker, Brac- Death of Billy Snook Recalls His Contests With W. G. George.

Memories of other days in England are recalled by the death of W. Snook of Shrewsbury, who passed away last month at Birmingham. He was born in 1860, being two years junior to his great rival, W. G. George. Those who have followed athletics since the early eighties will recall the many duels these two famous runners had, fortune sometimes favoring one and then the other. Snook won both the Midland and National cross. country championship in his time, and many Midland, northern and English championships on the flat and over steepiechase courses. One of his best years was in 1883, when he had the satisfaction of winning both the mile and four miles championship of England. His great rival, "W. G.," was a bit off on championship day, and the result was a series of matches later in the year. They were to be at one, two and four miles, but the rubber was not necessary, as the Wiltshire runner proved the winner in the first two events.

Prior to this, however, they had come together in rather a curious way due to the enterprise of the honorary secretary of a well-known London club. He put on a one-mile scratch race, for which both George and Snook entered. To get them to both appear, however, was a problem, so he interviewed both, and told each the same tale, viz, that the other was so confident of winning that his friends were willing to lay 6 to 1 on him. It was never more than 6 to 5 on either, and naturally the two runners were tempted by the odds, both taking a bet at 6 to 1.

The event resolved itself into a duel, and after a fine race George won in a shade over 4 mins, 21 sees, which was a grass record. Naturally this took a bit tof interest off the match races to follow, but the sporting world enjoyed the ruse which brought the two cracks together.

The pair had some more remarkable naces in the following year. Prior to the championships, George had a sunstroke, and it looked as tho he would have to play second fiddle to Snook, particularly when the Shrewsbury man beat his rival in a 1500 yards race in record time. This was only one week before the championship, but George came on a lot in the time, and after a terrific race he deteated Snook in the mile, with the swas only one week before the cham G. George. 
AN ACCIDENTAL DEATH. Jury Finds that George Mahon, Chatham, Failed to Place Signals.
