

LABOR UNION SEEKS TO PROVIDE WORK

Painters, Will Adopt Direct Contracting in Effort to Relieve Unemployment.

The adoption of a policy of independent contracting in an effort to ease the present work scarcity was announced yesterday at the Labor Temple by the unemployment committee of the Painters and Decorators' Union.

The Grand Truck freight clerks, at their regular meeting, decided to protest to the management of the roads regarding the reduction of the working staff.

From motives of economy the Painters and Decorators' Union has dispensed with the usual services of the Financial Secretary, S. Styles.

The joint industrial council at its regular monthly meeting noted the progress in many of the building trades of negotiations for wage agreements for 1921.

MILK FACTORY WORK IS SUNDAY NECESSITY

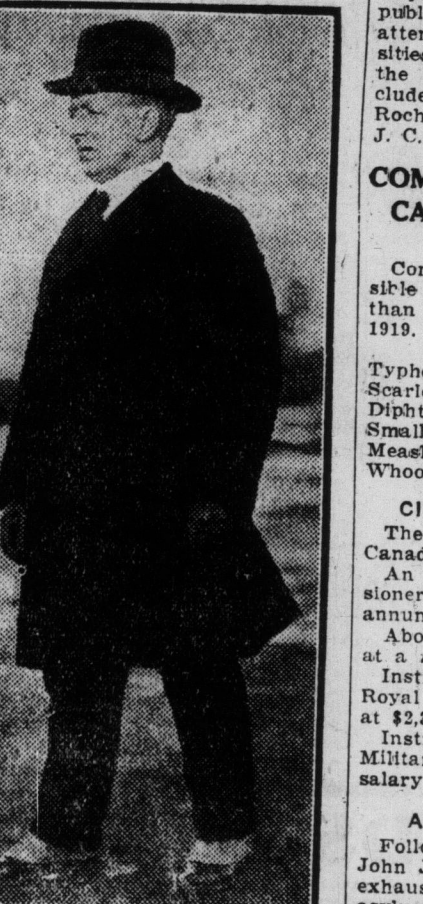
