Gibbons Issues An Ultimatum

Says if Les Darcy Wants a Bout He Must Take Small End of Purse

New York, Mar. 12.—Mike Gibbons today ended his siege of the Les Darcy stronghold and prepared to beat it back to St. Paul. A final deal was hatched at Darcy in the shape of a statement to the effect that there will be no Darcy-Gibbons match now unless Darcy agrees to Gibbons' acceptance of \$5,000 more than Darcy's end will be.

The statement in the Melbourne Argus that he's a man who fought and ran away to live and fight another day has back-fired, for the time being, for there is no place within the confines of this state where he can lay down his reputation for a few thousand dollars.
