The total membership in our societies is now 8721. with 1518 on trial, an increase for the year of 700. We hope however to see still larger accessions and results more nearly commensurate with the efforts that are being put forth.

We now desire to address to one and all words of loving counsel and of warning. Some of you are but babes in Christ needing to be fed with the "sincere milk of the word that ye may grow thereby." Rejoice, little children, that your sins are forgiven for His name's sake. Be followers of God, and followers of those who through faith and patience now inherit the promises. Remember for your encouragement that the "good shepherd" loves most dearly the lambs of His flock, gathers them with His arms and carries them in His bosom. Some are young men, strong physically and strong in the Lord; and others are fathers in Israel, who have watched with thankful hearts the growth of our Church, and in the days of her weakness contended for and manfully maintained her rights. We still prize the counsels of your matured minds, and your matured piety, and shall hold your memory in 'grateful recollection when you have crossed over the border land, and are reunited with the many friends of your youth and manhood who have crossed before you.

Dear brethren, we would beseech you to guard against a stationary religion. Our religious life may be, and is, when healthy, and the proper means are used for its increase, one of constant growth and development. The blade, the ear, the full corn in the ear; the grain of mustard seed, the smallest of all seeds but when it is grown the greatest of herbs; these and other metaphors of similar import are used by Christ the Great Teacher as descriptive of it.
