

Through this clinic every infant born in this hospital is kept in touch with the authorities of the department, for one year after its birth, this being considered the most trying year of a child's life. A report is brought into the hospital every two weeks, or answer a summons from the juvenile court.

With the splendid start made in the first three weeks of January, this year promises to outnumber previous records. During this period no less than forty-nine babies were born. Twenty of these were boys. Three pairs of twins were included in the number, one of the three sets being a cunning colored couple.

In the public ward accommodation is found for the thirty-five infants and eighteen in the private ward. No place could be more sunny, sweet and airy than this temporary home of these young hopefuls. Each in a separate cot, with its date bearing the name, date of birth and sex, these babies receive the greatest care and attention. The weight of each is taken regularly each day, which shows the progress they are making. The average increase in weight does not usually exceed one ounce per day, but one recently born infant has gained as much as four ounces.

These babies are all brought up on a scientific method. Great thought is given to feeding, regular hours, and fresh air, each child being put out for so many hours a day if the weather is not too cold. This regimen was followed a period of four days has expired.

Long carriages which hold as many as eighteen babies are used for conveying them to and fro, so that the proud mothers may have a glimpse of their young offspring. Here, too, care is taken to avoid any mistake being made. Each child has a tiny tag attached to his or her wrist with name and date inscribed. This saves time and anxiety on the part of the parent, which was caused in another hospital at a very recent date. Here a tired nurse, worn with the care of such a large family, lined up her little ones to distribute them to their various mothers. As soon as they were quickly dispatched she retired to her own quarters with a sigh of content as she thought of the few moments peace that were to be hers. An impatient ring broke the stillness, however, and as she responded to the call a real colored lady exclaimed indignantly: "I say, Miss, don't you know ma own baby?" "Oh!" said the nurse, "you're queering mother; that's your baby all right!" Whereas the exasperated mother replied: "Ma baby, he is a real colored nigger—none of your white trash for me, thanks," as she handed the innocent little offender over to the surprised nurse in charge.

As to the weight, six pounds six ounces is the average weight of babies when born. The heaviest baby on record tipped the scales at ten pounds seven ounces, and the lightest was two pounds two ounces.

The premature ward, which is only the third of its kind in America, is one of the most interesting features of the department. This has at present seven occupants, which is the largest number that has ever been known in this hospital. Here tiny specimens of humanity are coaxed into life, through the untiring efforts of the one nurse in charge, who is absolutely the only person admitted. In a temperature of 85 degrees these small mites are nourished through the body with oil, and fed by means of a medicine dropper. Through the greatest care these infants in from three to four months' time are turned out sound, healthy babies in every way. At the present time the smallest baby born in the hospital, which weighs one pound thirteen and one-quarter ounces, is thriving nicely, and the authorities state, although it is but two days old, that there is every chance of it being kept alive.

Women to Detect Shoplifters.

The war has seen an enormous increase in cases of shoplifting, so the manager of a large West End emporium informed me (writes the London correspondent of the Daily Dispatch). Largely he attributed it to war worry. "There is no increase in the ranks of the ordinary professional shoplifting class," he said. "The people of whom I am speaking come generally from the superior classes, and a short interview with them will usually soon prove that they are innocent of any dishonorable intent, and that they have acted without realising in the least what they are doing. The result has been that we have had to employ many more agents to safeguard our stocks, and for this purpose women have proved invaluable. Our procedure, when we are assured that it is not a case for the police is to suggest a contribution to one of the war funds—a suggestion which is always acted upon with alacrity."
