New York, Oct. 24.—On the great estate called Lyndhurst, at Irvington-on-Hudson, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Finley J. These questions of course will be the first that any one wants answered. And the best answer is to "cut back," as the moving picture impresario phrase it, to introduce a new date after showing one of the present. Found on Cathedral Steps. The past scene is the Fifth avenue front of St. Patrick's Cathedral; the time, midnight of Sept. 12, 1914. Patrolman Charley Diegan of the East 53rd street station, going south on his beat, touches his helmet passing the centre of the door of the church. Looking toward the facade of the big grey building, he sees what appears to be a bundle on the ground in front of the southern door. He approaches it, flashes upon it his electric lantern, and discovers a small boy, pretty, flaxen-haired, and with big blue eyes, shaded by long dark lashes. The bundle picks it up, wishes he could have it himself, takes it to the station house, and it is turned over to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. And there ends the contrasting picture.

On its payment side the insurance act has had eight cents, the employer six cents, and the state four cents. Free medical attendance at all times, an allowance during sickness of \$2.50 a week for men and \$1.75 for women for the first three months, and five shillings for permanent disablement were the principal benefits, while a maternity allowance of thirty shillings for the mother of each child born was a popular feature. The simple reason for the failure of the great enterprise to meet the expectations of its sanguine promoters is that expenses have far exceeded the original estimates. The billings of salaries for consumptives at a cost of \$7,000,000 was an important feature which has not been realized because of lack of funds to build. The doctors of the United Kingdom have profited greatly through the insurance act, according to popular belief. In the beginning there was a deadlock between the government and the British Medical Association over the terms of payment to the official physicians. Those chosen were to have seven hundred people accredited to them, at an annual rate of \$1.80 a person, including drugs to be furnished by the State. A compromise gave the doctors a maximum of \$2.25 a possible patient. The estimates of the total cost of medical attention under the act were about \$8,000,000 for 14,700,000 persons, but the actual results are not known.
