Chicago, Feb. 18.—William J. Sullivan, veteran catcher of the Chicago American League Club, who was given his unconditional release this week, held many records during the twenty years he played professional baseball.

Statistics compiled here show that Sullivan caught in 1,800 games during his sixteen years' career as a major leaguer. In one season, while a member of the Dubuque, Ia., Club, he caught 194 consecutive games. He also won distinction a few years ago by catching three balls dropped from the Washington Monument.

The Toronto Baseball Club nearly lost the services of one of its most promising prospects and Charlie Isaacs, the dashing young third-baseman, all but lost the use of an eye on Saturday.

WELSH PREFERS
LONG BOUTS

Cannot Be Charged With Shirk-
Engagements—Long Fights of
Bygone Days

"Freddie" Welsh, who at least cannot be charged with shirking engagements and who is not reported as having imitated that redoubtable warrior, John L. Sullivan, and told challenges to go get a reputation, says that he prefers twenty rounds to ten rounds. In fact, he has intimated that the longer he goes the better he goes.

This calls to mind the long fights of bygone days before gloves came in. The record for number of rounds was made in 1825 in Cheshire, England, when Jack Jones whipped Patsy Tunny in 276 rounds. Mike Donovan, with whom Theodore Roosevelt has boxed, and who still teaches the many art, fought Bill Crowley ninety-six rounds. John L. Sullivan and Jake Kilrain were at it for seventy-five rounds. Like Wei, Irish featherweight, fought Frank Murphy, English champion, eighty rounds to a draw.

The longest continuous fight was that between Bowen and Burke at New Orleans, twenty-five years ago. It lasted one hour and nineteen minutes, during which period there were 110 rounds. Glove contests at first went on bare knuckles. Jim Carney and Jack McAliff
