WHAT'S DOING IN THE MONEY AND STOCK MARKETS TODAY

MORE PURCHASING POWER NEEDED

Ottawa Canadian Club Hears View That Trouble is in Financial System. Ottawa, April 25.—That a producing system has been developed and a capacity to produce and deliver goods far in excess of any possible demand, short of that overwhelming consumer war, while on the other hand there are vast areas of people lacking necessities through shortage of purchasing power, was the main contention of an address delivered to the Canadian Club yesterday by Major H. H. Douglas, author of "Power and Democracy" and kindred works on the present economic situation. He contended that the real difficulty in the financial system and that something had got to be done to enable the people to get more purchasing power. Otherwise all productive efforts were stultified by the inability of the general population to consume what has been produced. Major Douglas warned that if those who have the capacity to remedy the defects of the present system did not devote themselves to the task, they would have to stand down and let people less fitted for it from lack of experience, try to do it.

New York, April 24.—Developments last week pointed to a gradual slackening in pace of business in the United States. BUILDING COSTS HIGHER.

(Frederick Gleason) Marked advances in various hardware lines have taken place recently due to it is said, increased prices of raw materials.
