## WANT TO BE SEVENTH STATE.

Presque Isle, Aug. 12.—(By Canadian  
Press)—Aroostook County wants to  
sever connections with the State of Maine  
and become the seventh New England  
State. The idea has taken hold of the  
population "hard" and the leaders of the  
movement are thoroughly sincere.  
Aroostook is the northeastern part of  
Maine and with 6,408 square miles con-  
stitutes about a third of the state's area.  
Since 1900 the state has grown more  
than 80 per cent. in population and 800  
per cent. in valuation. It is one of the  
most important agricultural areas in the  
United States and the leading potato sec-  
tion of the world.  
The long distance to the state capital,  
Augusta, is one of the arguments set  
forth.



## DIET OF MONKEY MEAT WITH SIRLOIN OF POISON SNAKE

Explorer Who Spent Three  
Years in Brazilian Jungle  
Tells of Adventures.

New York, Aug. 12.—Summoned from  
the wilds of the Brazilian jungle, where  
he had been exploring for the American  
Museum of Natural History, by a tele-  
gram announcing the imminent death of  
his mother, Ernest C. Holt, explorer, ar-  
rived here on the steamship Pan-Amer-  
ica. Mr. Holt, who returned with his  
wife, has been in South America for  
three years, and brought back with him  
600 specimens for the museum.  
At one time during the expedition his  
party was lost in the jungle and lived  
on meat cut from poisonous snakes and  
monkeys.  
In speaking of his diet of snakes and  
monkeys for twenty-five days, Mr. Holt  
said:—  
"We lived mostly on monkeys during

that time, but on one occasion we had  
to resort to eating snake stew or face  
starvation. We ate the stew. We had  
killed a poisonous snake about nine feet  
long, cut off his head, took out the sir-  
loin and stewed it. It tasted something  
like cod, not so good, you know, but then  
anything tastes good when you're real  
hungry."

## UNIQUE SENTENCES ARE HANDED OUT


New York, Aug. 12.—Caesar Walton,  
West Hoboken Police Recorder, who has  
attracted attention by the unique sen-  
tences he has been passing out, out-  
lined to lawyers in his court a new plan

them to jail, I'd like to sentence them

## NEAR WRECK ON A HAYCOCK.

Washington Naval Aviator Picked Up  
in Flight, Jamming Control.

Washington, Aug. 12.—Commander  
T. G. Elyson, who was the first Amer-  
ican naval officer to enter aviation, en-  
countered a novel experience while mak-  
ing a flight this week from the naval  
station at Anacostia, and narrowly es-  
caped accident when a haycock jammed  
the control wires of an airplane in which  
he was flying.

Commander Elyson was talking off in a  
navy machine when the tail of his

plane picked up the haycock from a field  
which had just been mowed. The hay  
jammed in the control wires leading to  
the tail-flippers, and several extremely  
unpleasant alternatives were presented  
forthwith to the pilot. He could not rise,  
he dared not nose her down, and a turn  
to the left probably meant going into a  
spin. The encumbering hay prevented  
him from giving his machine right rudder,  
and there seemed nothing left to do  
but drive ahead at a landscape which  
presented an uncomfortable outline of  
trees and houses drawing nearer with  
the speed of an express train.

By skillful jockeying of the airplane,  
Commander Elyson was able to keep it  
from nosing in and at the same time  
guide it out over the Potomac in a wide  
turn which brought it back to the land-  
ing field; but here he was balked in his  
purpose to land by several machines in  
his way. Another swing several miles  
across was necessary, with the airplane

still at a low altitude and speeding like  
the wind. This time the airplane was  
brought down in safety and the com-  
mander called it a day.
