LOCAL NEWS

TO THE BORDER.

Sergeant Detective John T. Power went to St. Stephen yesterday to look into the matter of the murder case in which he made an arrest recently.

REV. DR. RIDGOUT HERE.

Rev. Dr. Ridgout, of the Methodist church of the United States, who has been at Seaside, Calif., taking part this week in the evangelistic services in Brussels street mission, and will leave next week for work in western Canada.

BUY YACHT.

Roy Mayes and Arthur Knight of the North End have purchased the yacht Evelyn from Chester Brown. It is of cabin cruiser type with auxiliary engine and is thirty feet over all. They have entered her in the St. John Power Boat Club's fleet.

TO NORTH SYDNEY FOR BURIAL. The body of Mrs. Susan McCallum was taken to North Sydney on the noon train today. The funeral will be held there tomorrow afternoon. Accompanying the body were Mrs. McCallum's son and daughter, W. M. McCallum and North Sydney and Miss Helen McCallum of this city.

LATE FOR ROLL CALL.

Mayor Schofield complained this morning about tardiness on the part of some of the commissioners arriving at the regular meetings. He expressed a hope that they would endeavor to be in time as there was usually considerable business of importance to transact.

MRS. W. F. J. LUNN.

Mrs. Amelia Jane Lunn, wife of Wm. F. J. Lunn, died today, in the fifty-fourth year of her age, leaving her husband, two sons and three daughters; also two sisters, Mrs. Chas. Wilson and Mrs. Chas. Roberts, and one brother, W. H. Blatchford. The funeral will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday from 121 Robbsey avenue.

POLICE COURT.

In the police court this morning Allan Albert was charged with being drunk and using abusive language. He pleaded not guilty. Sergeant O'Neill told of arresting him in Union street, West St. John, on charge of being drunk and using profane language. Policeman Gorman corroborated this evidence. The accused denied that he was drunk and used abusive language. He was fined \$16 or four months. Two men charged with drunkenness pleaded guilty and were remanded.

STRATTON-HILLMAN.

In Trinity church this morning the rector, Canon Armstrong united in marriage David J. Stratton and Miss Mary A. Hillman, both of this city. The groom was supported by his brother, W. Stratton, and the bridemaid was Miss Pearl Hopey. Only immediate friends were present. The groom is employed with I. McCarthy & Sons. After a short wedding tour the happy pair will reside at 92 St. Patrick street. Both bride and groom have a wide circle of friends who extend good wishes.

THE WORK ENDED.

The information service branch of the department of civil re-establishment, in Prince William street, was closed today and the work completed. This office, since opening in January 1919, has had very important work to do, including furnishing information of all kinds to returned men, besides getting positions for the men and looking after their various needs in the way of instruction and guidance, not laid down in any rule book. This office has been in charge of Major F. H. Rows, who has most successfully carried on the work in helping along the re-establishment of the soldier.

ONE MAN CAR TEST THIS AFTERNOON

Mayor Schofield notified the members of the council at this morning's meeting that a demonstration of the "one man car" would take place this afternoon at 3 o'clock. He said that an endeavor was being made to have representatives of the Trades and Labor Council, of the Board of Trade, the Commercial Club and the newspapers present. The car, he said, would go over the main line and around the loop at Indian town. He felt that this would be a good test as the rails were wet and the grades along the main route the heaviest in the city.

BURIED TODAY.

The funeral of Miss Annie L. Carey was held this morning from her late residence, 33 Horsfield street, to the Cathedral. Requiem high mass was celebrated by Rev. Zed Landry, assisted by Rev. Raymond McCarthy, deacon; Rev. Simon Oram, sub-deacon; and Rev. P. Allen as master of ceremonies. The final absolution was administered by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc. Interment was made in the old Catholic cemetery. The funeral of Walter Downing of Harbor Grace, Nfld., was held this afternoon from the mortuary chambers of N. W. Brennan & Sons, Main street. Services were conducted by Rev. R. M. LeBlanc and interment was made in Fernhill in the field of honor for soldiers' and sailors.

AT THE HOSPITALS.

R. C. Campbell, 261 Water street, West End, who was injured while working on an elevator conveyor yesterday morning, was reported from the General Public Hospital this afternoon to be resting comfortably though badly hurt. The condition of Jennie Alward was reported as fairly good, and showing signs of slow improvement. Mother Patrick, at the Infirmary, remains the same.

Miss Helen Kennedy, 164 Sydney street, who was injured yesterday morning in King street, when struck by the wheel from the city ambulance, is resting fairly comfortably though suffering considerable pain. She was badly cut about the face, neck and arm.

WATER MATTER AT CITY HALL MEETING

Discussion a Bit Spirited at Times This Morning—A Douglas Avenue Question.

A question as to whether or not the Water and Sewerage department or the Public Works department should pay for the installation of a fire hydrant in Broad street near the city's property caused quite a discussion at a committee meeting of the common council this morning. Commissioner Jones submitted a report showing that, in order to extend the water main and install the hydrant, an expenditure of \$2,400 would be involved. He maintained that it was for the benefit of the Public Works department the cost should be charged to them. Commissioner Frink took objection to this and said that it was the property of every citizen and that at the present time there was only a one inch pipe to protect \$85,000 worth of city property. Commissioner Jones maintained that there were two hydrants at a distance of about 400 feet and he felt that they were adequate for fire protection.

After considerable cross firing between the commissioners it was suggested by Mayor Schofield that the matter be settled by two commissioners to work out for the benefit of all.

Another question, which brought out considerable discussion, was that of paying Engineer Murdoch's bill for surveying the city's timber lands. Loch Lomond. It was said that it was originally estimated that the work would cost \$800 and that the ultimate cost was well above \$2,000. It was said by the commissioners that work of this kind should be done by the city engineers and they should pass necessary papers and secure certificates to allow them to do so. On question of Commissioner Jones the bill was ordered paid.

Commissioner Jones submitted a blue print showing a proposed extension of an eight inch water main from Egbert street to Russell street, a distance of 800 feet for an approximate cost of \$5,000. It was said that this would prove for supplying this district. It was moved that the work be undertaken and paid for out of the water and sewerage department maintenance and this was unanimously carried.

Commissioner Jones also submitted a blue print of Douglas avenue showing the number of vacant lots. He said that he had not as yet notified owners to have sewer connections made to these lots and he did not feel like going ahead with it until proper grades had been made to the street and sidewalks.

Commissioner Frink said unless the owners were forced to enter the sewer that next year when the pavement was laid the street would be torn up. He strongly advocated a more progressive system and spoke of other Canadian cities where water mains, sewers, gas pipes, conduits, etc., were laid before any houses were built and the expense was charged to the property owners. He said that the act gave authority for the commissioner to force property owners to have sewer and water connections made and if they did not that the work be undertaken and charged to them. After considerable discussion it was decided to defer action until the matter could be looked into by all of the commissioners and the city engineer.
