Labor Future In The Motherland Still Shrouded In Doubt

What Trades Unionist Has to Say About Prohibition

French General Attacks Lord French About Situation Before First Battle of Marne — Fusiliers, Rangers and Worcesters in Melee in Dover Street — Outstanding Bits From Life in Metropolis of Empire.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)
London, Jan. 15.—This week I met one of the genuine old trade unionist leaders, a thoroughly sound labor man who is actively in the movement. He was in a very much disgruntled and decidedly pessimistic mood. He protested that he could not tell me what was likely to happen in the labor world. The extreme section in the unions was resolutely bent on trouble, and he really did not know how things would work out. When I asked him what the extremists wanted, he said: "Henderson said what they want plainly enough at the inaugural meeting of the nationalization campaign."

In London last December, the nationalization of all essential industries and a new social order; or other words—a "revolution." I suggested that the parliamentary interests with the by-elections going so hopefully for labor, might keep the extremists quiet. Not a bit of it," he said. "They tell you openly that they don't care a rap about general elections. They can get all they want without parliament. It seems the great scheme now of the extreme labor high-brows is to make things so impossible that they force the government to accept their chief desideratum—the elimination of private profit. Their plan of campaign includes a general strike about the time parliament meets again."




Buying for Germany.

That is one very arresting illustration of how prices are forced up, and kept up, in this country just now.
