

DOG SMUGGLING A TRADE
Even Aeroplane Used to Get One Into England From Continent—Stories of a Customs Officer

Smuggling dogs into England from abroad is not quite a recognized industry, and well organized (remarked a customs officer at Dover the other day to P. Doubleday). There are men at Calais, Dieppe and other continental ports, who will guarantee to get any dog across the channel, and deliver him to any place in England that may be agreed.

Their charges range high, from £20 to £25, according to the size and breed of the animal, but wealthy dog-lovers do not mind paying generously in order to spare their pets the ignominy of having undergone three months' quarantine, and themselves the discomfort of being separated from them during all that long period.

Of course, there are also people who try to smuggle their dogs across "on the sly." They are usually women, and I may say that it is very rarely successful.

The big bag muffs, now so popular, are the usual receptacles for small toy dogs. Only the other day I had my suspicions aroused by the exceedingly careful way a well-dressed lady passenger was carrying one of these down the bottom of a big Saratoga trunk.

Pretending to stumble, she grabbed the muff fairly hard, and as she fell, a yelp was emitted from inside. The lady dog-smuggler had to pay about £5 fine and costs, and her pet was quarantined for all.

Toy hounds are the easiest dogs to smuggle because they never bark. We once found one of this particular breed at the bottom of a big Saratoga trunk beneath a pile of costly dresses. It had evidently suffered considerably from its prolonged confinement, in fact, it was half-suffocated; yet it never uttered a sound.

On another occasion the lid of a cardboard box which was supposed to contain assorted French chocolates, started bulging upwards in a strange manner. On taking it off there emerged to view one of the smallest black pomeranians I ever saw.

Actors and actresses are among the most persistent sinners in the matter of dog smuggling. They run over to Paris, or Vienna, or wherever they may be, in order to fulfill a professional engagement, and thoughtlessly take their pets with them, ignoring or not recognizing regulations as to quarantine on re-admission to the United Kingdom.

Wealthy society women, too, not infrequently suffer from similar lapses of memory. It is people of this type who patronize the professional dog-smugglers.

Many of them do not mind what they pay.
A Tug for a St. Bernard

One high-born lady had her great Dane brought over by aeroplane at a cost of £100. This method
