Local Red Cross Reports the
Serious Need of Financial Help.

Much to Do, and Hope for Assistance is Expressed at Meeting.

That a serious situation faces the local Red Cross committee, because of lack of funds, was the report at a meeting this morning at headquarters. The funds are at an end, Miss Alice Murdoch reported. She said the work was actually held up until more funds were available. The meeting thought that money should be found without resorting to pantry sales or similar means. The soldiers looked to the Red Cross for cheer to bear what they had lost in fighting for their country, Mrs. Atkinson Morrison, presiding officer, said, and she felt sure that anyone seeing this statement would send something to tide over the summer months.

Miss Murdoch reported that 71 cases had come to the depot for relief during the last month and no more could be helped because resources were gone. F. B.
