The E. & N. A. RAILROAD.—Fifty miles of the European and North American Railways have now been completed and trains run regularly to Lincoln.

The towns through which it passes are Venice, Ortona, Grosseto, Livorno, and Genoa.

The amount of business and travel thus far has exceeded expectation, and gives encouragement of a successful enterprise.

The time table is so arranged that cars leave Lincoln in the morning in season to connect at Bangor with the early train for the West, and returning, a train continues on at night to Lincoln in connection with the Maine Central, thus allowing passengers the opportunity of going to and from Lincoln and this city or Boston in a single day.

THE EXPLORER LIVINGSTONE.—Mr. H. A. Churchill, British Consul at Zanzibar, who recently returned to England, speaks with confidence of the safety of Dr. Livingstone, from whom he has had letters of a date more recent than that of his reported murder.

It is his opinion that Dr. Livingstone, having heard of the discovery of the Northern portion of Lake Albert Nyanza by Sir S. Baker, has directed his route in search of the Southern boundary of that lake, and that in the course of a few months it is probable that further news will be heard from Dr. Livingstone himself.

MR. LONGFELLOW who is now sojourning in the north of England, was waited upon by a representative of the Literary, Scientific and Mechanical Institute of Carlisle who made a brief but very complimentary address.

Mr. Longfellow's reply was equally brief and very appropriate. In it he claimed to be a "Cumberland man." But when the English "How do you hear?" had ceased he added, quietly, "The county of Cumberland, in the State of Maine, three thousand miles from here!" which was followed by a hearty laugh.

MACKEREL.—The Summerside (P.E.I.) Journal says: Mackerel are coming in very plenty this season.

At a stage owned by the Hon. G. W. Howland, near Cacumpe Harbor, the boats took 46 barrels mackerel on Friday and Saturday last, one man and his boy took 1000 mackerel, and a number of others took from 300 to 600 each.

ST. GEORGE.—This picturesque and pleasant town, is thriving rapidly; several vessels are loading there and large piles of bright new lumber may be seen piled up on the wharves ready for shipment; on every hand there is evidence of thrift. Several new dwellings and stores have been erected within the last twelve months, and others are in course of erection.

On the corner of what we believe is known as Commercial street Abram Young, Esq., has erected a large and showy tenement which is being furnished, in modern style for two large Dry Goods establishments, with ample cellar room for a bonded warehouse.

Mr. Young has three new stores adjoining in the same block already tenanted, one of which is occupied by himself on King street. There are several very neat dry goods stores on Commercial street well filled with choice assortments of merchandise; among them we noticed our friends Jas. A. Moran and J. E. Lyndall, Esqrs., and others.

Capt. James Bogue has also recently finished the upper part of his large building on the Avenue, for a public Hall, the dimensions of the spacious room are 55 by 40 feet, exclusive of two auto rooms, over which is erected a large Orchestra the breadth of the building and about twelve feet wide; the heavy cornice in front is made to remove adapting it for a stage. The hall is well ventilated and lighted by a large chandelier, and hanging lamps at the sides. We understand that the Hall is to be opened this evening with a large Ball.

In the immediate vicinity of the town, are some handsome villas, delightful country residences, and indeed there are also several in the town; a new personage has recently been erected, and is being made ready for the Rectory.

St. George is a delightful summer retreat for strangers who are shut up in large cities from year to year. But we must state there is little hotel accommodation—in fact it has been said people in the village should be prepared to receive strangers, as they cannot hope for lodgings at the present establishments. A large summer hotel we believe would pay well. The crops in the vicinity look well, and promise a fair yield.

An alarm of fire was given on Wednesday afternoon; the roof of the building occupied by Mr. Bridges having caught fire from a spark. By timely assistance the fire was put out with a few buckets of water, before the engines arrived.

The Japanese colony of tea growers who have settled in California, are said to have a very successful beginning in the work of cultivating the plant. The seed nuts are coming up finely, and the foot hill lands are found to be admirably adapted to the tea culture.

A bank in Boston on Wednesday paid \$8000 on a forged check, purporting to be signed by Brewster, Sweet & Co.

At a travelling menagerie in Orleans, France, recently, the wife of the proprietor was passing the cage of a lion with her infant in her arms, her dress sweeping the bars, when the beast seized her gown with one paw, and as the woman turned round, snatched with the other the child out of her arms, dragged it with in the cage, and nearly devoured it before assistance arrived. The animal was shot.

A Calcutta savant named Cameron has startled India by the affirmation that a race of tall men and women are to be found in the forest of Borneo.

He says that his information comes from Sarawak traders, who state that this "missing link" race live in the trees, have bows and arrows and other rude implements, and subsist entirely by hunting.

A Philadelphia paper in discussing the weather, says:—"The showers of the last three days will cause every stalk of corn to carry ears like a jackass, while every watermelon will fancy itself a larger beer keg dressed in Paris green."

The fire is still burning in the woods in Washington Territory. The smoke is so dense at Monticello that objects at fifty yards' distance are hardly discernable.

Advices from Japan report the finances of that country in a very demoralized condition. Paper money was forced upon the people on pain of death, and trade was paralyzed.

One of the officers of a Brooklyn bank, a son of one of its directors, decamped three weeks ago with \$10,000 in currency, bonds and credit checks. He was arrested in that city last evening, and has returned the bonds and checks amounting to \$35,000, leaving the institution a loser of \$5000. The names are withheld from publication.

The village of Canning, N. S., has again been destroyed by fire, although the conflagration was not as extensive as in 1867.

Sergeant Wingfield, employed as one of the doorkeepers of the Senate, Ottawa, has fallen heir to the snug fortune of over \$60,000.

TERRIBLE SHIPWRECK.—The Japan papers contain accounts of the wreck of the steamer Hayamaru, June 17, on a rock seventy miles from Yokohama, when twenty people were drowned.
