The alleged "scandals" may be brought under two heads: (1) those in which officials of the ministry are charged with having been negligent, extravagant or corrupt; (2) those in which the policy of the ministry is said to have caused public money, land or dimber to have accrued to private persons, often supporters of the ministry. It is noteworthy that there is not one alleged "scandal" in which any minister has been charged with malversa tion, or the use of his fiduciary position to make personal profit. This only is the sort of "scandal" that has hitherto injured or destroyed Canadian cabi-Charges of Corruption.

It is certainly true that some officials were negligent and extravagant, but none have yet been proved corrupt.
