EFFECTS OF VEGETABLES ON THE HUMAN RACE

The recent Pathological Congress held in Paris has given us some most interesting facts about vegetables and the effects they produce on the human race. The members of the congress, after numerous experiments, have agreed that, although some vegetables are a preventive against disease of any sort or another, there are many others which produce the opposite effect.

They declare, for instance, that potatoes should be eaten by judges, magistrates, editors and those engaged in similar occupations, because they develop the reasoning faculties and give great mental balance and calmness of reflection. FATAL RESULTS OF

NEW ENGLAND STORM

AUBURN, Me., July 2.—Frank Isabelle, a Frenchman employed as a section hand, was killed by lightning in the storm this afternoon while working on the Maine Central R. R. about four miles from this city. His body was standing near and was knocked over by the shock, but not injured. Isabelle leaves a wife and children.

WEST KENNEDY, Me., July 2.—While working in a hay field this afternoon, Edward Waterhouse, aged 32, and a horse he was driving were struck and killed by lightning. He was unmarried and came here a few weeks ago from Sanford to visit his brother. The storm was a most frightful one. There was much thunder and lightning and a torrent of rain struck with hail.

LEWISTON, Me., July 2.—The electrical storm which passed over this city this afternoon, caused much damage. Several trees were struck by lightning in Lewiston and a bolt struck the house of D. F. Thompson, of Webster, tearing a hole in the roof and doing damage to the rooms. A few bad washouts are reported.

LOWELL, Mass., July 2.—The first electrical storm of marked intensity for this summer broke over this vicinity today, causing the death of one boy knocking a baby from its mother's arms, destroying a barn and starting several fires. Roy Erickson of South Cleburn was the boy killed. The lad had been picking berries and had just jumped over a stone wall into the road leaving his companions under a tree when he was struck and instantly killed by a bolt. Mrs. John J. Griffin was holding her baby in her arms when a bolt of lightning hurled the little one from her arms, inflicting, however, but a slight shock upon it. F. C. Sill's barn in North Tewksbury was burned after being struck by lightning and many other places were damaged by bolts.

PORTSMOUTH, N.H., July 2.—A torrential downpour of rain accompanied by almost continuous lightning did in one hour thousands of dollars worth of damage in this city and vicinity. Many buildings, including the Advent church on Hanover street, were struck and badly damaged by lightning, but no serious fires resulted in the city proper. The electric road was held up all through the storm.
