# PERSIANS NOW LOOK FOR BRITISH AID

**Establishment of Gonstitutional** Government Would be of Value to Britain

TABRIZ, April 12. — Presumably the foreign office realizes the gravity of the isues now at stake, and the gravity of the situation in which great Britain has deliberately placed herself; but it is incomprehensible why no adequate steps have been taken to force the diplomatic pace. It is now two months since a communique reinforced the reference to Persia in the King's specch. Sir Edward Grey's statement was still more emphatic. These pledges to help were entirely unsought by the Persian Constitutional party. Once given, they were taken seriously, as the British name for honor. is great in Persia. She now looks to the foreign office to redeen its words; if it fails to do so, it is in danger of being ridiculed. If Tabriz were starved into surrender, the difficulty of coercing the shah would be immeasurably increased.
