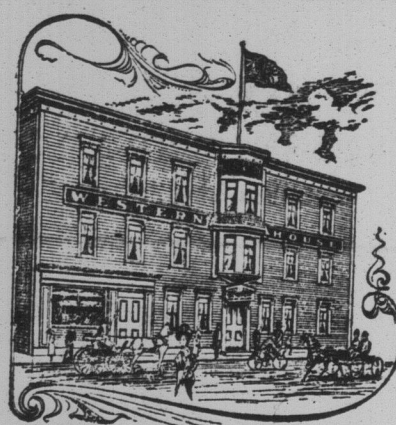

**JOHN MARSHALL A MUCH
MARRIED MAN.**

It is alleged against Jas. Marshall, a
61 year old man of New York, that he
possesses 100 wives, scattered about
America. This was the charge brought
against him by Marjorie Friel, who has
him arrested for obtaining all her goods
and chattels by false pretences. Mar-
shall had posed as the father of Mrs.
Edith Ross' who ran a big matrimonial
agency in Philadelphia, and it is believed
that he was the guiding spirit in the con-
cern. When Marjorie Friel invited the
police into Marshall's home they made a
remarkable haul. They seized no fewer
than 2,000 letters answering Marshall's
advertisements. "Wanted a Wife, wealthy
refined, elderly gentleman, alone, gener-
ous, will make a devoted husband." A-
mong these love missives were several
from women asserting they had fortunes

and children. One wrote that she had a
husband, but was tired of him and want-
ed a new one, with money enough to di-
vorce the old. A widow confessed to
being fair, and forty, but said she was
lonely. One girl in her teens, admitted
she was not beautiful, but virtuous, and
"beauty" was only skin deep, any-
way. "Furnish daughters by the hun-
dreds, wrote that they were sick of coun-
try life, servant girls pleaded tired of

young idea to shoot. Marshall had

He still maintains his innocence of the
crime. In jail lately he has spent much
time in writing letters thanking those
who have worked for him and shown him
kindness during his long imprisonment.

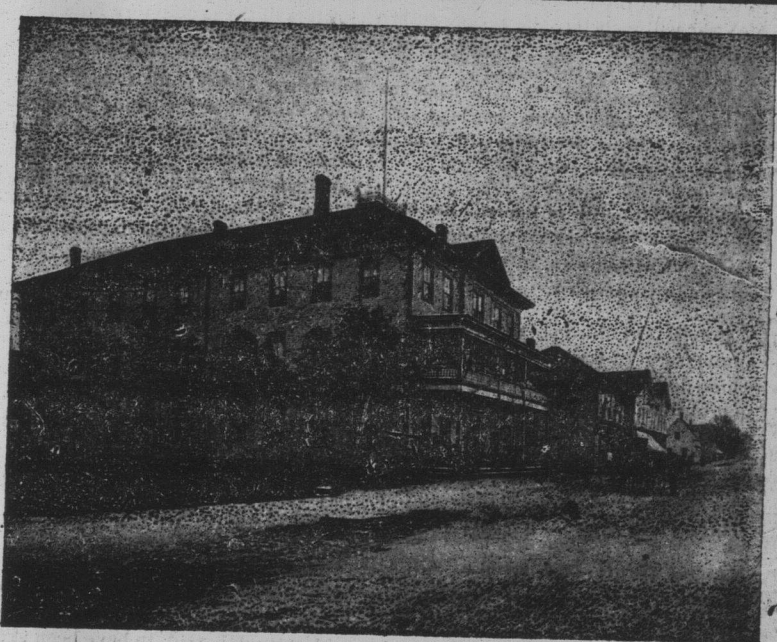
