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GREEKS WIN FIRST VICTORY;
TARBELL'S GOOD BOX WORK

The ice is broken, the Greeks have at last struck their stride and they won their first game of the season Saturday afternoon when they defeated Woodstock with a score of 8 to 1. Joe Tarbell, the favorite, was in the box for the winners and he must certainly have put the sign of the Cuckoo on the heads of the visitors, as the visiting team could do nothing with him, and during the entire game only made two safe hits off his delivery and only four Woodstock men got as far as the third base and only one reached as far as the second base.

In addition to the fine pitching by Tarbell, George Winter was in charge of the team playing center field and playing the fast ball that he is so capable of doing. Then there was big Jack Nelson, who carried off the honors for leaping on the ball, making no less than three two base hits and bringing in two of the eight runs. ST. JOHN HIGH SCHOOL WINNERS
DEFEAT RTHESAY AND MONCTON

St. John High, 51½, Rthessay Collegiate, 32; Moncton High, 6½; 5 records smashed and two others equalled; a 100 yard dash in 10 seconds. Such in brief, is the result of the interscholastic track meet at Rthessay, on Saturday, when Rthessay, Moncton and St. John schools competed for the interscholastic track cup.

As the results show, the local boys were easily the winners. Indeed there was little doubt at any time as to who the winners would be and from the first heats of the hundred till Townsend romped across the line an easy winner in the mile (the last event) the enthusiastic yells of the St. John supporters were always in evidence.

It was almost 2 o'clock when the sports began. The heats of the 100 yards dash were run off first. As a result of these Bridges and Foley of St. John won places in the final. Both the preliminaries were fast. Bridges easily winning his heat in 11.15 seconds. This heat was contested between the heats and final of the 100 yards. In this event the St. John boys easily demonstrated that they had the goods. Sinclair, St. John, was the first jumper and had no difficulty in clearing the bar on his first try each time. He cleared the 5 feet 3½ inch mark was reached. He succeeded in clearing this on the third attempt. Bridges seemed to be a little off at first, after his first race in his heat of the 100 yards, but found his jumping legs and easily cleared the bar at 5 feet 3½ inches. This was the highest mark reached. Bridges was placed first, Sinclair second. Rthessay and Moncton being third.

The high school boys celebrated their victory over their New Brunswick interscholastic rivals Saturday afternoon at Rthessay, N. B., when they defeated Rthessay and Moncton in a track meet.

The cup which the St. John boys annexed on Saturday, has been in competition among the high schools and collegiate institutions of New Brunswick for the past five years. It was given by the old boys of Rthessay in 1908, when Frederick High won it. The following year, St. John annexed it in 1910. Rthessay obtained it, holding it the following year but losing it to St. John this year by 1912 points.
