

# COUNCIL PAYS A TRIBUTE TO LATE CHIEF

## City Sustained Great Loss in Death of Fire Chief Kerr.

### WAS DEVOTED TO HIS EVERY DUTY.

### Routine Matters Considered at Length by Council at Yesterday Afternoon's Meeting—Leases Taken Over.

At the meeting of the Common Council yesterday afternoon the commissioners paid a tribute to the memory of the late chief of the fire department, and transacted some routine business.

His Worship referred to the loss the city had sustained by the death of Chief Kerr. After speaking of the long and intimate relationship with the late chief, who through for many years a busy and capable leader, he had always been deeply interested in fire-fighting, and had a strong ambition to become chief of the fire department.

"Since he obtained the position in 1883," added the mayor, "he has conducted the department to the satisfaction of the public at large, and the city of St. John has by his death lost an official whose place cannot be easily filled. He was noted for his firmness in regard to discipline, and throughout his long term of office the efficiency of the department was well maintained. His passing removes a competent official and an estimable citizen, but he leaves the memory of a career of faithful devotion to duty which his friends and fellow citizens may well be proud of."

Com. McLellan heartily concurred with His Worship's remarks. He appreciated the loss the city had sustained. He had known the chief for many years and believed he was imbued with one idea—that of performing his duty. The chief might have been impulsive, but he had no intention of wounding or hurting anybody.

"Since my connection with the department," added the commissioner, "I have always found him working for the best interests of the department. The city may secure successors who, in the opinion of the curb firemen, may be better fire-fighters, but never a man who had better intentions, a keener desire to discharge his duties faithfully and well."

Com. McLellan then moved the following resolution:

#### Resolution of Regret.

"Whereas, this Common Council has learned with regret the death of John Kerr, Esq., K. C., who for upwards of thirty years has filled the office of Chief of the Fire Department of the City of St. John, having in his youth been connected with the department under its system of volunteer organization and who for several years was an Alderman for Dukes ward;

"Resolved, that this Common Council place upon record their appreciation of the services which the deceased for so long a period of time rendered to the community; of his energetic discharge of duty and of the efficient but not exacting discipline which he maintained in the department. His genial warm-heartedness, his generosity, his sense of justice and his care for the best interests of the men under his command, have evoked their respect and admiration. Those who, as members of the Council, have come in contact with him as an official, have always been impressed with his devotion to the work of the department for love of which he withdrew himself from many other activities and opportunities of life. As an official, as a representative, as a citizen and particularly as a friend, he leaves behind him a memory which cannot fail to be a consolation to his widow in the time of her severe affliction. To her this Council desires to extend their deepest sympathy in the hour of trial which has so suddenly come upon her.

"And be it further resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the widow of the deceased."

Com. Wigmore seconded this motion. He said that as a member of the salvage corps he had come in contact with the late chief at many fires. Sometimes the chief may have seemed arbitrary, but his heart was in the right place. The chief was well liked by the members of the fire department as well as the general public; the general respect he had manifested at the funeral.

The motion was then passed by a standing vote.

#### The Clayton Claim.

A report was received from the recorder recommending that the city take no action on the claim of James P. Clayton that the fire plug and catch basin situated at the present junction of Waterloo and Brussels streets were on his property.

P. A. Smith was granted permission to erect an illuminated sign over his shop No. 183, block E, Queen street.

The city engineer was authorized to designate the locations of three poles for electric light wires on Clarence street, and one on Douglas avenue. The poles are being placed by the St. John Street Railway.

An order was passed instructing the chamberlain not to accept rent payments that will commit the city corporation to a further renewal period of any leased period, without the authority of the commissioner of public lands.

It was decided to take over the lease of lot No. 2, block E, Queen street on May 1st, for the purpose of widening Crown street. The lease is held by Mrs. Octavia Hodges.

#### Making a Fire Boat.

### THE PRICE OF SHAVES MAY GO TO 15 CENTS

#### Some Local Barbers are Already Agitating for this Change to Take Effect on May 1st.

Much interest is centred around the agitation being set on foot by the barbers in the city for an increase in the price of shaves to 15 cents.

Although many are strongly in favor of the advance, there are some dissenting voices in the city who disapprove of the proposed increase, and are inclined to keep the price down to ten cents.

If the change is brought about it may increase the profits of the barber, but on the other hand it may also mean such steps being taken by the barber shop proprietors.

The journeymen barbers, who are organized, feel that, with the increase in the price of shaves, they are justified in making a demand for shorter hours and more pay. Several meetings have been held relative to the matter, and it is understood they are asking to have a new schedule introduced by May 1st.

The demand of the journeymen barbers is that after May 1st, they receive \$14 a week, that they go to work at 8 o'clock each morning and knock off at sharp 8 o'clock evening except Saturday when 11 o'clock in the evening is named as the closing hour. The barbers further demand that they work on no public holidays.

At present it is the practice of most of the barber shops in the city to keep open during the forenoon of public holidays.

### Would Sooner Work Ashore.

Yesterday afternoon William Cleavers and Arthur Walsh, two seamen, were given in charge by the first officer of the steamship Kumara for absenting themselves from the ship without leave. It is stated by the shipping agent that the seamen in port in many cases would prefer to leave their vessels and work on shore and the officers of the ships have to keep a sharp lookout to prevent desertion on the part of some of the men.
