GOOD SAVE THE KING

MAKES BERLIN RING

Irish "Army" Dressed in
Green Gets Filled with
Beer and Makes a
Scene.

SIR ROGER'S RUSE IS

HIT BY BOOZE

Curses Dutch and Damns them
Fine and Sings Our Anthem
O'er the Rhine.

Toronto, April 29 Special to The
Mail and Express.—The Irish
Karlton Hackett today gave out de-
tails of the lamentable failure of the
late Sir Roger Casement to recruit an
army from Irish prisoners in German
camps. Sir Roger was supplied with
abundant money and empowered to
offer the prisoners land, titles and
anything else if they would join the
cause. Sir Roger was a heavy
drinker. He had been supplied with
brilliant green uniforms and paraded
through Berlin as "the advance
guard of a mighty army" that was to
co-operate with Germany in over-
throwing the haughty British Empire.

A Thirsty Army.
It was a holiday and the Irish
parade did not move a half-block
until a beer stove hove in sight and
the columns of four or five heavy
drunks for it. They had been copped
up in prison camps for months with-
out any liquor and the opportunity
was not to be overlooked. There were
many such stunts during the parade,
which by the way, was never finished,
for the Irish, after about the twelfth
stop, rising to their feet.

One gigantic red-headed son of the
old sod put the question to his fel-
lows, who were no longer marching
in columns by this time: "For why
should we be doing the dirty work of
the dirty Dutch when we are dacent,
peaceable Irish boys? To hell with
the Dutch and be damned to them."
The "army" staggered along a few
steps further, with this idea sinking
in and suddenly the Irish gathered in
a circle in the middle of the street and
with one accord and at the top of
their voices yelled, "God Save the
King." They continued to sing it un-
til the scandalized police arrested the
entire "army" and hustled it back to
the prison camps.

BRITISH AND U. S.

LABOR MEN MEET

Political Weapon of Labor
Should be Used to Strengthen
the Military, Says Arthur
Henderson.

London, April 29.—The delegates of
the American Federation of Labor
who are visiting England with the
American labor mission had a confer-
ence today with members of the
executive body of the trades union
movement in London. The delegates
and the national labor party
committee and the national labor

ment with the war aims of British
labor.

labor party in the House of Commons
and others addressed the conference.
Mr. Henderson explained that the atti-
tude of British labor was that every

international labor and socialist con-
ference, including representatives from
enemy countries for the frank discus-
sion of a possible peace.

The conference adjourned until to-
morrow to give the Americans an
opportunity to consider the points
raised.
