More Controversy Over Scottish Tour

Secretary David Roy Issues Further Denials re Financial Statement — Incorrect Reports Cause Annoyance.

Winnipeg, Jan. 4.—"It is just another case of misinformation which has caused the Scottish football officials to write in such a manner," stated Secretary David Roy, of the Dominion Football Association, when asked concerning the letter published in a Montreal paper from T. D. Sloan and R. M. Connell, of the Scottish football team that toured Canada and the United States last summer.

"I am expecting a letter from Mr. Sloan and Mr. Connell, which the next week or so, as I am quite aware that incorrect reports sent from Montreal have been causing annoyance to these gentlemen in Scotland," said Mr. Roy, Secretary Roy, and he would publish the letter and it should clear up all the contentious matters.

"The statement is quite correct in regard to no contract being signed and is also right in that \$75 per man was agreed upon and paid over before the trip was over started. 'Secretary Roy added: 'We never made any statement that money was deposited or paid over to players before reaching Montreal.

"The letter says that the \$500 per man agreed upon was paid later, which bears out the statement of President MacNeil that the players tackled him at Halifax and demanded that they be paid a fixed sum. No body ever stated that the Scottish players were given \$1,500 each out of the line was made before the players sailed for Canada, and I still hold the document signed by the Scottish authorities. A guarantee of \$2,000 per game was made to the tourists, but it is not right that he remained or was to become the property of MacNeil and myself. The agreement was signed for the D.F.A., but in making such agreements it is customary to specify who and what you are, and that it is the only reason for our names being used. It is foolish to think that we could share in the United States money as the vouchers were properly signed at every game.

Bookmakers And Cashiers Pinched

Ninety-Four Men Charged With Violation of Locks Anti-Gambling Law on New Orleans Track.

New Orleans, Jan. 4.—Forty-seven bookmakers, together with their forty-four cashiers operating at the fair grounds race track, were technically arrested at the conclusion of today's racing card by being directed to report to the chief of police on warrants issued on information furnished by District Attorney Marr, charging violation of the Locks Anti-Gambling law. Bond was fixed in each case at \$500.

17-Year-Old Horse Is Retired From Turf

London, Jan. 4.—The coming of the new year will mark the retirement from the English turf of the seventeen-year-old horse, Platonic, a bay gelding by Bluebird out of Golden Love, and owned and trained by Sir B. G. Goby.

Platonic has had a long and varied career, during which it won no fewer than 23 races and finished within the money innumerable times, and was successful in winning its last race, the Bay's Bedding Handicap Steeplechase, over the two-mile course at Windsor on Wednesday, December 14, prior to this race, Owner Goby announced that, win or lose, Platonic was making his final appearance in public. Jockey Beardon, who had had the mount on Platonic many times previously, was selected to ride the veteran, and the old horse, in his opinion, never performed better in any of his earlier races than he did in his last one. At the water jumps Platonic displayed all his "old-time cleverness" when going to the obstacle on the wrong leg by getting in too short a way to measure it off and send into.

In the action ring, after the race, the old horse was up for sale, the auctioneer remarking: "Here is the best popular horse in training and a very useful one in the harness." No bids were forthcoming, however, and Platonic is being returned to his owner, a few days in teaching the young as how to jump.
