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one of the most powerful revivals of religion ever experienced on the Horton circuit.

Impelled by holy zeal, he soon began to work for God, and in the usual way entered our ministry in the year 1846.

He labored diligently and with considerable success in the Gospel vineyard until 1867, when, on account of failing health, he became a supernumerary. He resumed the work after resting two years, but was compelled again to desist before one year had elapsed. He was greatly beloved on all the Circuits where he travelled. He was exceedingly affable and genial in disposition, full of brotherly love, and ardently attached to the doctrines and usages of Methodism.

With simplicity and fervor he proclaimed the truth of the everlasting Gospel. During the last three weeks of his sojourn on earth he was confined to his bed by severe illness; but, in the midst of all, he was graciously sustained by the felt presence of God. He calmly passed away to the home of the soul, in Halifax, during the Session of the Conference, on Friday, June 28th, 1872, in the fifty-fourth year of his age, and the twenty-sixth of his ministry.
