PRESBYTERY WILL CONTINUE SERVICES AT CHELSEA GREEN

Student Will Be in Charge of Church in Summer Months.

A long discussion on the question of making the normal pastorate of a Presbyterian minister seven years was held at the afternoon meeting of the London Presbytery on Tuesday. The seven-year pastorate found little favor with the majority of the members of the Presbytery. It was at the request of the General Assembly that the Presbytery discussed the question, and it was moved and seconded that the assembly be asked to submit a more comprehensive plan.

The Chelsea Green problem was brought up and it was finally suggested that a student be obtained for the summer months at the Chelsea Green Presbyterian Church and something definite done at a later date. The committee on the Chelsea Green problem was enlarged by adding the names of Rev. W. J. Crawford, Rev. G. M. Young, Rev. D. McKay, Captain Archibald Graham and Elders W. E. Laidlaw, Angus Armour and W. McComb.

Offer Appointments.
The Presbytery agreed that the chairman of the general board of the Presbyterian Church in Canada be the moderator of the assembly for the year, and that the appointment of permanent officers to the executive be deferred. Rev. W. J. Crawford was appointed to the General Assembly's committee of bills. Mr. D. McKay was appointed to the synod's overtures committee.

A. M. Miller and James Gorwill of New St. James' Church and William Smith of Knollwood Park were recommended as students for the Presbyterian ministry.

R. D. McDonald of the board of managers of Knollwood Park gave an encouraging report on the progress of the Presbyterian Church in this district since the settlement was made, and stated that the work was being transacted in a most harmonious manner. The Presbytery adjourned to meet on the third Tuesday in April.

The township, following similar action in other rural municipalities of the county, has appointed Malcolm Blue to be township road superintendent at an allowance of \$900 yearly. He will appoint the commissioner and supervise all work in the township.

A Catholic Women's League, with Mrs. Patrick Meahan as president, has been organized in the city with a substantial membership. The other officers are: Miss Helen Loran, vice-president; Mrs. John Butler, second vice-president; Mrs. John King, third vice-president; Mrs. Margaret Coleman, recording secretary; Miss May Maxwell, treasurer. Mrs. B. C. McCann and Mrs. J. Leach, London, assisted in the details of the organization.

Pet Crow the Culprit.
A pet crow owned by a resident of Chestnut street is now blamed for the theft of the silver spoons found in a hole yesterday south of the city. The neighbors report the bird as stealing clothes pins from the line and leaving Monday's washing to be found in the windows of the third story of Myrtle Street school children's school. The crow was killed recently, and although guilty of many offenses, it is mourned by many people in the southeast end of the city.

Death of Miss Graney.
Outside of the bad habits the bird is said to have been a conscientious testator.

Miss Elizabeth S. Graney, daughter of Mrs. Mary A. Graney, 85, died of an illness of some months in her 28th year. Miss Graney was the winner of the Forbes-McFarlane scholarship at Queen's University, Kingston, and from that institution she received the degree of bachelor of arts. Miss Graney was a member of the Young Ladies' Society of the Church of the Holy Angels, and is survived by her mother, James Graney, 235 James Street, St. Thomas; Mrs. H. P. Maloney, Rochester; Gertrude and Dorothy, at home and brothers James and Edgar. St. Thomas; J. Gladstone Graney, Cleveland, Ohio. The funeral will be in the Catholic Cemetery Thursday afternoon.

FARMERS' CLUB MAY CUT OUT GROCERIES

Takes Too Much Time For the Small Profit, It Is Claimed.
BRUSSELS, March 15.—The Cranbrook Farmers' Club may shortly drop the handling of store goods and confine itself to the shipment of stock and bringing in carloads of feed grain, wire, shingles and coal. The grocery end of the business demands too much time and the profits are small, it is stated. R. Leatherside and daughter will sell their property in town. Mr. Leatherside has lived in Brussels for the past 40 years. His only son resides in Winnipeg, as well as a sister and brother-in-law.

The officers of the law are making inquiries concerning the selling of cigarettes to minors, some of them mere children. Cases may be heard shortly.

24-MILL TAX RATE FOR GENERAL FUND FIXED BY COUNCIL

Aldermen Would Not Wait for Education Board.

TO BRING IN FIGURES

School Taxes Will Likely Be Collected in Separate Installment.

Less than half an hour was taken at a special session yesterday afternoon by the city council to fix the general tax rate for the city of London for the year, 1921, at 24 mills on the dollar, to pass the necessary bylaw authorizing the rate and making June 1, and August 1, as the dates for the collection of the first and second installments respectively, with a discount of 2 per cent if the first and second installments are paid in one sum on or before June 1, 1921.

This action was taken when the city clerk reported that the board of education had failed to comply with the request of the council that their revised estimates should be ready for inclusion in the fixing of the tax rate. What further action will now be taken in the matter the council decided rests with the board.

Decision to go ahead followed a motion by Ald. William Wilson, seconded by Ald. Watt, which was unanimously adopted.

The amount to be raised by the general tax is \$1,157,564.15, and for patriotic purposes \$31,632.57, a total of \$1,189,196.72.

NORFOLK FARMERS ARE EXPECTING TO GET ON LAND SOON

All Indications Point To Splendid Crops During Coming Season.

SIMCOE, March 15.—As a result of the continued mild weather farmers all through this district are making preparations to get on the land at an early date. They are hoping to get under way early and get everything finished quickly. There is every indication that this year will be an unusually busy one in the country, as many farmers, desiring the security of help, are making extensive plans for production.

E. E. Holmes of the Bank of Commerce staff has received orders to report to the superintendent at Alberta branch at Calgary, and will leave for the West shortly.

The high school baseball team has been organized by J. P. Jones, president, W. W. Martin, manager, and J. Mason, captain. An attempt is being made to get a county junior league with teams from Delhi, Waterloo, Port Rowan and possibly Port Dover in the group.

E. E. Langford has been sworn in as clerk of the election officer for the referendum vote on April 18. Up to the present little local interest has been in evidence, and it is predicted that the vote will be light. In the county there the strong feeling is in favor of the "dry" movement, and a heavy vote against liquor importation is expected.

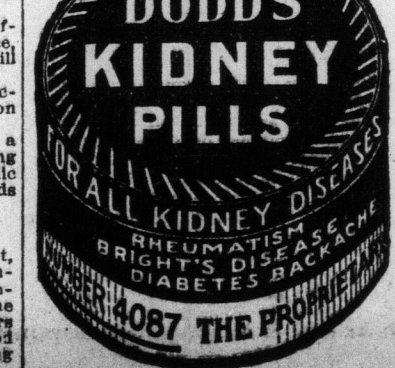

SEEKING PARDON FOR CRAWFORD

Youthful Prisoner Is Proving Rather Costly To the County.

ST. THOMAS, March 15.—A pardon or parole is being asked for Lawrence Crawford, the Port Burwell young man, who was sent down for six months, a few weeks ago, for selling whiskey by the bottle. Crawford, owing to his infirmities, both hands being paralyzed, has a special attendant at \$100 a month. Both the prisoner and his aide occupy cells in the same flat, and neither is producing any special profit for the county. Mrs. Mary Tagg, one of the inmates who escaped from the County House of Industry a few weeks ago, and been lost to the rural community, was picked up in Springfield last night and brought to the court jail this morning. Later she was remanded for a week.

The handy man, James Shell, who eloped with Mrs. Tagg and Mrs. Dennis, another inmate, at the institution, is still unaccounted for, and Mrs. Dennis is also at large.

Mrs. Tagg declares that she separated from the party in St. Thomas and she went her way and they went theirs, and she has been travelling incognito between here and Cheltenham ever since and doing odd jobs for a living. When Mr. and Mrs. Tagg married six years ago, they spent the honeymoon in a local livery stable, and before starting on their trip were married in Springfield. Mr. Tagg was committed to the house of correction for not giving much credence to the tale of Mrs. Tagg's travels, since she ran away with Handy man Shell.
