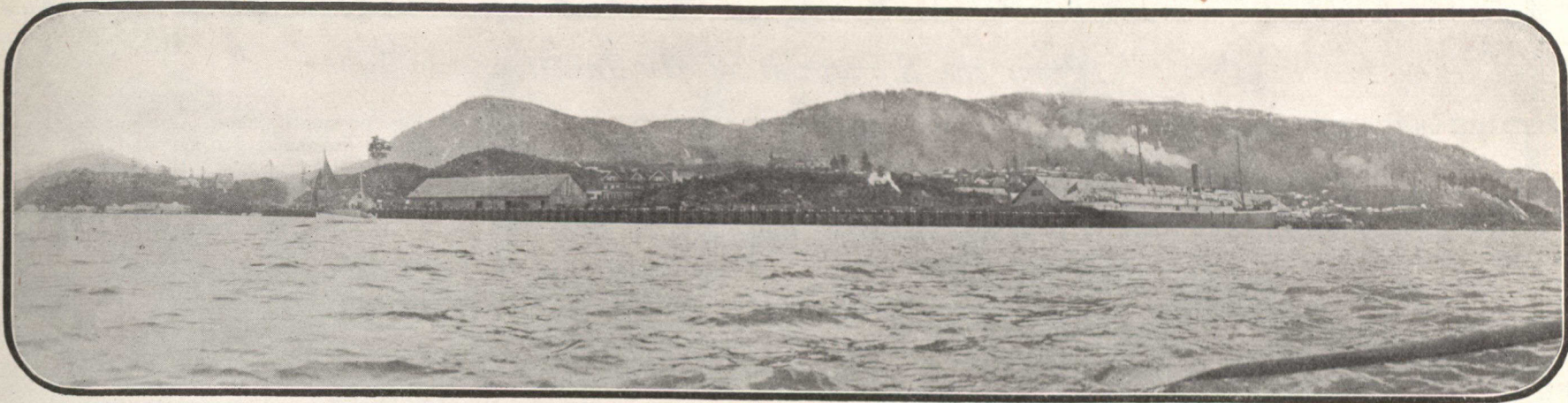


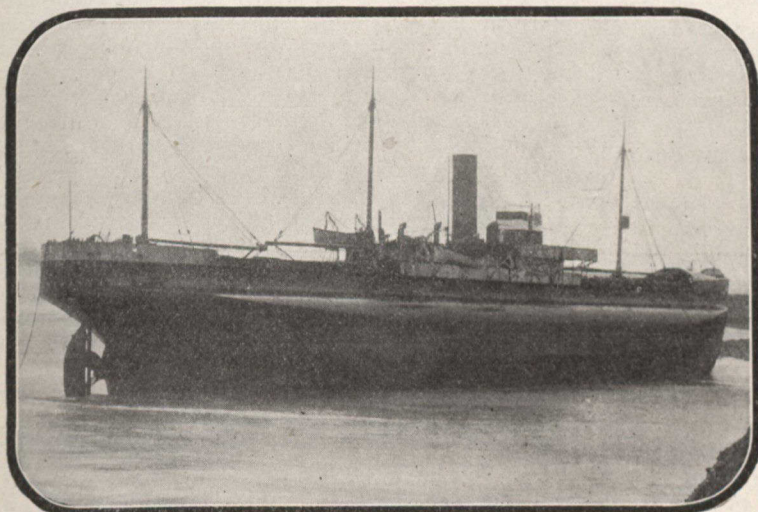

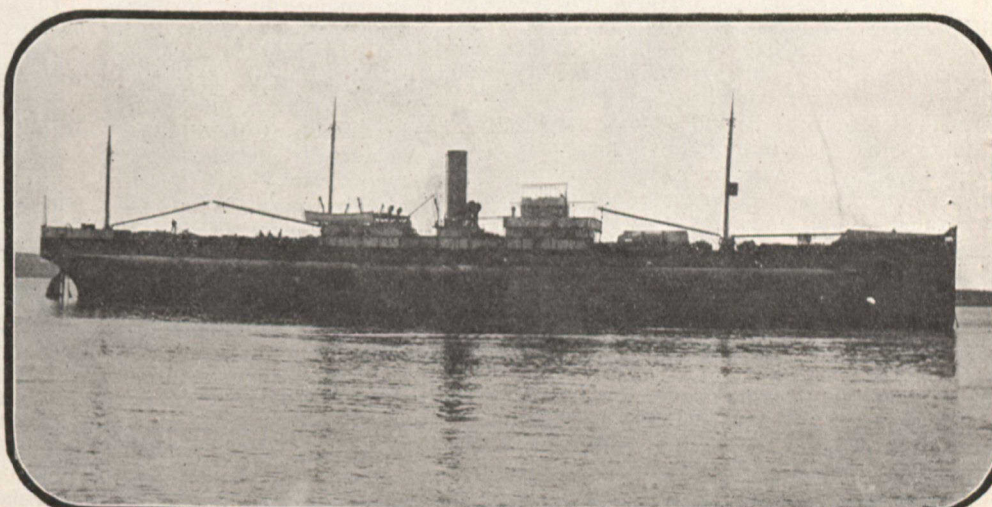
Prince Rupert from the water, showing the facilities for shipping at the Western Terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific.
