A Safety Challenge

Patricia A. Ovenden has been Occupational Health and Safety appointed safety co-ordinator for the University of New Brunswick.

Ms. Ovenden, who began her new duties on March 6, is a native of Fredericton. She graduated from Fredericton High School in 1971 and received a BSc in biology from UNB in

For most of the past 13 years she has been employed at UNB as a scientific technician in the department of biology on the Fredericton campus. Ms. Ovenden's work as a technician involved her in various aspects of safety. She has served as the Technical Staff Association's representative on the UNB Joint

Committee and has been a member and chair-person of the biology department's safety committee. Her experience with safety co-ordination activities and exposure to current legislation and regulations in the areas of occupational health, chemical handling, waste disposal and the transportation of dangerous goods are expected to prove valuable in her new position.

"This job covers a wide range of safety concerns, so there's a lot for me to learn and I'm both pleased and excited by that challenge," Ms. Ovenden said. The duties of the safety co-ordinator include all aspects of industrial safety, radiation monitoring and protection, the development of safety training programs and compliance with federal and provincial safety legislation.

One of Ms. Ovenden's immediate concerns in her new position will be continuation of the implementation of the Workplace Hazardous Materials Information System (WHMIS), a new identification and information system to aid in the safe use of hazardous materials in the workplace.

Ms. Ovenden succeeds Douglas Smith who held the position of safety co-ordinator at UNB for three years.

It should be understood that after the initial production of a certain number of books, the SU can receive copies over and above this number at a lower rate.

The source of funding for the yearbook is "student fees, and reserve Council money," explains Mr. Carson. "This is not to the detriment of any other clubs,

societies or functions," he emphasizes.

Mr. Carson will be making a recommendation to Council in the near future, being that yearbooks prior to and including 1988 should be sold for \$5.00 each and those for the current year, for \$10.00 each. Former graduates of past years are eligible to receive a free yearbook (for

their graduation year) providing they possess the necessary proof of graduation.

Future graduates will also likely be able to receive free yearbooks upon graduation, assuming that future Councils also adopt the policy. "Our intention is that this will be continued in the future years," Mr. Carson states.
