children must ordinarily be resident in the Union with their parent at the time of application. Children who are not minors cannot be included in a parent's certificate. If they desire to be naturalized, they must make application on their own behalf.

(d) Persons naturalized under laws in force in the Union prior to the passing of Act No. 18 of 1926, who do not apply for a certificate under the last-mentioned Act, retain their existing rights and privileges.

Chapter I of Act No. 18 of 1926 defines what persons shall in the Union be deemed to be <u>natural</u>-<u>born British subjects</u> and follows the lines of Part I of the British Nationality and Status of Aliens Act, 1914 (4 and 5 Geo. Ch. 17).

- It provides that the following shall in the Union be deemed to be <u>natural-born British</u> <u>subjects</u>, namely :-
 - (a) Any person born within His Majesty's Dominions and allegiance; and
 - (b) Any persons born out of His Majesty's Dominions whose father was at the date of that person's birth, a British subject, and who fulfils any of the following conditions, that is to say, if either --
