Furniture Polish.

CHILDREN'S EYESIGHT.

Worthy of Attenti Some correspondence has passing of late days regarding a subect which is of great importance to the physical welfare of the rising generation. I refer to the eyesight of school children and its due preservation Miss Honnor Morten of the

London School Board, has taking a special interest in matter, and her remarks are worthy of attention. That a great number of children exhibit defective eye powers, is an undoubted fact, and when defects are left unheeded, as they too often are, they are apt to result in permanent injury to sight such as unquestionably handicaps a child in the race of life. At school such defects also exercise a very decided influence on the

child's progress. He is often blamed for being mentally backward when the real seat of his slowness or inability to keep pace with his class work is to be found not in the brain, but in his eyes. He is liable to suffrom headaches, the origin of which, in the attempts to accommo date his vision to his work, is often unsuspected. Altogether this ques tion is a very serious one from educational point of view, and it deerves to be raised and raised again, until some definite action is taken egarding it all over the land. Teachs themselves know only too well the hindrance to work that eye deects in their pupils may cause, and no body of men and women can more interested in any question than are the instructors of youth in this matter of sight troubles in their pu-

As is the case commonly with health matters, there exists a typical laissez-faire spirit regarding prevention of the defects to which I have alluded. Nowhere is this tacit eedlessness more typically illustrated than in the case of parents themselves. The bulk of parents seem to be perfectly contented to "let things where the health of their children are concerned, and they would be only too glad to have all responsibility for the care of eye troubles in their offspring shifted off their shoulders to those of school boards. I write under correction, but unless I am much mistaken I remember the case of the Liverpool board, which issued a circular calling the attention of parents to actual cases of eye defects in children as determined by medical examination. To the many notifications thus given only two or three replies were received. The vast majority of the parents treated the circular and its advice with contempt. For myself I would have some compulsory measures taken to enforce parents to look after their children's eyesight, simply because the matter is practically a national one.-From The London Chronicle.

Some interesting investigations have just been published by the analysts of the Government laboratory with reference as to what is known as the "oil of tobacco." up raw tobacco leaf into the articles with which we fill our pipes, manufacturers use olive oil, and at one time they made a use of it which, like Sam Weller's knowledge of London, was extensive and peculiar. In order to protect the smoker a paternal Legislature has enacted that not more than 4 per cent. of olive oil shall be used by manufacturers "making up" or "flavoring," and the businesslike manufacturer has sometimes complained that this 4 per cent. is not a sufficient allowance, because the tobacco leaf itself supplies an oil which might be mistaken for the manufacturing product. The Government analysts have, therefore, experimented with forty-six tobaccos and they find that the essential oil of tobacco usually exists only in the smallest of quantities, sometimes not more than .05 per cent. The oil is a pariffin-technically a pariffin hydro-carbon.-London Post.

Wood Too Hard to Burn. There are certain kinds of wood that are too hard to burn, or refuse to ignite for some other reason, such as ironwood and the good brier root, but it is a curiosity to come across a piece of common deal-the soft, light wood of which so many boxes are made-that cannot be set fire to.

The piece of wood in question was common white deal from Sweden, but was remarkable for its comparative weight. It had formed part of a boat belonging to a whaler and had been dragged below the surface of the water to the depth of more than half a mile by a harpooned whale. The length of line and the short distance from the point of descent after being struck at which the whale rose to the surface was a proof of the depth to which it had dragged the boat
